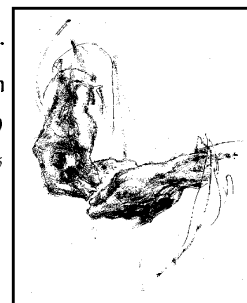

Sacrament of Marriage

Engaged couples begin preparation for the Sacrament of Marriage at least 6 months before their wedding. Please remember—a **wedding date will not be scheduled until the assessment of their readiness for the Sacrament of Marriage** has been completed. Contact the rectory for more information. Weddings are not scheduled during the Season of Lent.

Anointing of the Sick

The sacrament is for those having surgery, the seriously ill, the chronically ill, and those near death. If you know in advance that you are going to the hospital, call one of the priests to arrange for anointing at home or church. In addition the sacrament is celebrated at church on the first Saturday of the month after evening Mass and on the third Sunday of the month after 8:00 Mass. It may be repeated as needed.

## Obedience—Key Virtue of a Missionary Church

**O**NCE, OVER SEVERAL DAYS I saw an infant brought back to life. After many medical interventions there was little sign of improvement and hope for the life of the child was diminishing by the hour. Out of desperation the mother made this special request, *“Let me hold my baby!”* Once she had him in her arms she never let go. In the mystery of how the human body works, her touch made the critical difference. Her child survived, and today is a thriving teenager.

At first the Syrian General, Naaman, by choice *“keeps his distance”* from the prophet sent for his healing. And the lepers in today’s Gospel by law *“stood at a distance”* from others. By healing them God, especially as we see so often in the ministry of Jesus, *“closes the distance”*. Here again—as with the newborn child struggling for life—the **mystery of human personal touch** makes all the difference.

Yet these stories also reveal hesitation, unwillingness, even fear of getting too close, touching. Neither the prophet nor Jesus force anything to happen. The **love revealed** in these stories is **clearly unconditional**. But, its greatest, most powerful effect, often requires that I give up my arguments against its value, my desires for having my own way, and my presumptions that my life or our world cannot be any different than it is or I think it should be.

*Father, form in us  
the likeness of your Son  
and deepen his life within us.*

*Send us  
as witnesses of Gospel joy  
into a world of fragile peace and  
broken promises.*

*Touch the hearts of all men  
with your love that they in turn  
may love one another.*

*Opening Prayer, 8th Sunday in Ordinary Time*

I have learned and I believe that the best word to associate with the word **“obedience”** is the word **“listen”**. All these stories are

stories of obedience—listening. I would encourage you to use the following **questions to explore the virtue of obedience** in your life and your **faithfulness as a catholic Christian**.

*Whose love do I trust enough  
to give direction to my life when  
I most need it?*

*How often do others experience  
the unconditional love of God  
—an encounter with Jesus Christ—  
when they are with me?*

*Or with our parish community?*

Most simply put, we cannot give to others what we have not experienced ourselves. Our Church exists only for the sake of the mission of Jesus Christ. Obedience to the mission is obedience to the gift of love—received and given.

## Get Beyond Complaining

Strangely after his healing Naaman asks the prophet for truckloads of dirt to take home so he can pray better. *What’s going on here?* We all have brought home souvenirs of vacations or family celebrations as reminders of beautiful places or special times. These objects are sacred. They help us to **remember to be grateful** and **make present again unforgettable experiences** we never seem to tire of trying to put into words. Naaman wants to make an altar—a way for him to remember a **“peak moment”** of his life. He knows he’s been to the **“mountain”** — in God’s presence. He now knows that remembering—not forgetting—is the antidote against the deadly virus of complaining. *How have you—do you—remember such “peak moments” in your life?*

Try this recipe to dip apples, pears, carrots, or celery into for a tasty treat.

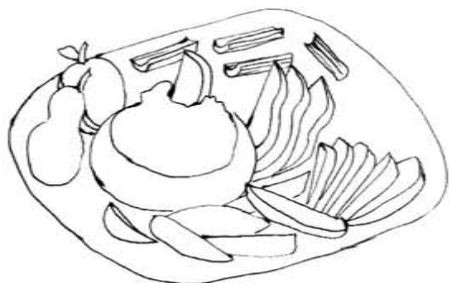
Blend together the following ingredients:

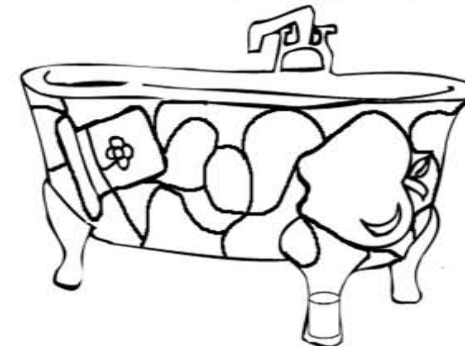
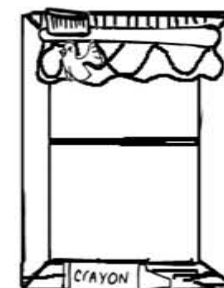
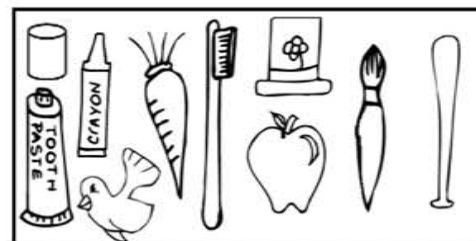

SIGNS OF CANCER WOMEN IGNORE

Women tend to be more vigilant than men about getting recommended health checkups. They are generally more willing to get potentially worrisome symptoms checked out. But not always. Younger women tend to ignore symptoms that could point to cancer. Some women are very skilled at switching to denial mode. This is almost always based on fear.

A healthy balance between denial and hypochondria is important. Here are some symptoms that should NOT be ignored.

- Many would be delighted to lose weight without trying. But unexplained weight loss, about 10 pounds in a month without an increase in exercise or decrease in food intake, should be checked out.
- Bloating is so common that many women just live with it. But it could point to ovarian cancer.
- Most of us know to look for any changes in moles, a well-known sign of skin cancer. But we should also watch for changes in skin pigmentation.
- Difficulty in swallowing could be a sign of GI cancer.
- Any woman who's got a pain in the abdomen and is feeling depressed needs a checkup.
- Smokers should be especially alert for any white patches inside the mouth or white spots on the tongue.
- As people age they seem to complain more of various aches and pains. But pain as vague as it may be can also be an early symptom of cancers.
- If you notice a lump or swelling in the lymph nodes under your arms or in your neck, especially, it could be worrisome.
- A fever that isn't explained by influenza or other infection, could point to cancer.
- Fatigue is another vague symptom that could point to cancer. If it is unexplained and constant, it needs to be checked out.
- Coughs are expected with cold, the flu, etc. But a very prolonged cough, defined as lasting more than 3 or 4 weeks, should not be ignored.

Be careful and be cautious, but don't over-react to these symptoms.

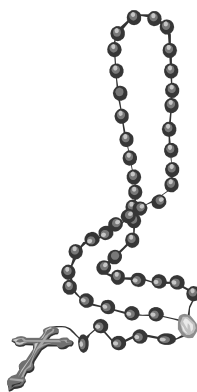

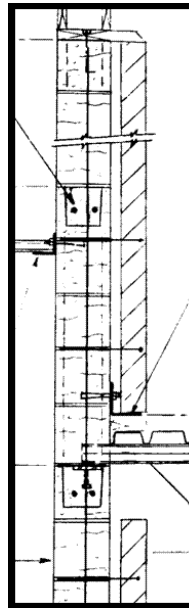

On July 28, 2010, a subcommittee chosen by the Church Renovation Committee interviewed three architects recommended by the Archdiocese of St. Louis Building and Real Estate Office. The committee members were: Fr. Mike (Pastor, Church Renovation), Peg Warnusz (Chairperson – Church Renovation), Mary Meredith (Church Renovation), Mike Petroff (Church Renovation, Capitol Improvements), Bob Stolte (Pastoral Council), Dan Glenzy (Finance), and Theresa McWilliams (Music Director, Liturgy Committee).

Using the work of this subcommittee, the Church Renovation Committee chose LePique and Orne as the architects for the church renovation project. The Renovation Committee met with the architectural designer, project manager, and principal contact on September 27<sup>th</sup>. Guided by the Committee's document *Recommendations for the Renovation of Holy Name of Jesus Parish Church*, the architectural team and Committee began the process of developing architectural drawings and floor plans. The architectural team and Renovation Committee will continue meeting bi-monthly. The drawings and floor plans will be ready to share with parish leaders sometime in January or early February.

The Renovation Committee continues to be thankful for those parishioners who have shared their vision for this project over the past two years. Please keep the work of this committee in your prayers as we continue this important work of our parish.
