Sacrament of Marriage

Engaged couples begin preparation for the Sacrament of Marriage at least 6 months before their wedding. Please remember—a wedding date will not be scheduled until the assessment of their readiness for the Sacrament of Marriage has been completed. Contact the rectory for more information. Weddings are not scheduled during the Season of Lent.

Anointing of the Sick

The sacrament is for those having surgery, the seriously ill, the chronically ill, and those near death. If you know in advance that you are going to the hospital, call one of the priests to arrange for anointing at home or church. In addition the sacrament is celebrated at church on the first Saturday of the month after evening Mass and on the third Sunday of the month after 8:00 Mass. It may be repeated as needed.

Prayer, Participation, and Active Parish Support Keys to a Faith-Filled Future

AST SPRING ARCHBISHOP CARLSON began speaking with the priests of the Archdiocese about how best to utilize their services in the mission and work of the Church in St. Louis. He is looking for new and creative options. He also wants to form and educate the laity for their roles of service in the Church and to encourage more collaborative ministry.

During the summer he set up a special committee of priests to study our present and future needs as well as to make recommendations on the use of our priests. This month a special Archdiocesan assembly of laity—two representatives from every parish—will meet with the Archbishop to talk about a vision for evangelization and planning for a faith-filled future. Greg Warnusz and Mary Ann Harris will be attending from and reporting back to our parish.

I encourage you to take some time to pray and talk about how our Church has changed during the past 50 years. The numbers below are just meant to get you started. Also, consider what a gift it's been that we've seen such an expansion of the roles of laity in the Church over these years.

One assumption the Archbishop's already made is this: Authentic, credentialed lay ministry in leadership positions in parishes is not an option, but a truth about our times. times. He also assumes that priests and deacons are at the service of vibrant, catholic faith communities.

"Spin **carefully**, spin **prayerfully**, leaving the tread **with God**."

Mahatma Gandhi

During our September *Convocation* he noted that when it comes to planning for the future neither the vitality of a parish (simply an ability to pay its bills) nor the size of a parish (number of people) matter as much as **the vibrancy of a parish** which he then went on to say would be marked by the following **characteristics**:

- A strong sacramental life—including preparation for the sacraments and planning for their celebration
- Serious attention given to prayer and spirituality
- Good catechesis and adult formation
- Programs of charity and justice awareness and attention the needs of the community where the parish exists
- Evidence of evangelization
- Strong governance, including regular consultation
- Responsible stewardship, including vocation recruitment

Our brief 5 year history as a parish has been **clearly vibrant**. As we continue these conversations with our Archbishop let's renew our commitment to the future and to the mission of the Church here.





Timely Wellness News & Ideas

Walking lowers stroke risk

Nearly all types of physical activity can benefit your health, but walking in particular may lower the risk of stroke for women. A 12-year Women's Health Study found that women who regularly walked at a brisk pace were 37% less likely to have any type of stroke and had a 68% lower risk of hemorrhagic stroke. Source: Stroke, Vol4 1, pg. 1243

A heart doctor's guide to fats

Polyunsaturated and monounsaturated fats are rich in antioxidants that can help lower your risk for heart disease. Easy ways to include these "heart-healthy fats" in meals include:

- Top salads with avocados, olives and walnuts.
- Use olive, canola, or flaxseed oils in salad dressings and
- Eat salmon or other fatty fish high in omega-3 oils twice a week.
- Snack on sunflower seeds and nuts like almonds. Aim to keep total fat calories to no more than 30% of all calories you eat, and limit saturated fats like those found in red meat, butter, and whole fat dairy products. Sources: The Michigan Health System; American Heart Association

Sleep and weight control

In addition to helping you stay alert, getting the right amount of sleep may help fight fat around your midsection. In one study, adults under 40 who averaged five hours or less of sleep a night had higher amounts of deep abdominal fat, the type that can increase your risk for high blood pressure, heart disease, and diabetes. Adults who averaged more than eight hours of sleep also had increased internal fat, although not as much as those who averaged less than five hours. Lack of sleep may also spur you to eat more to maintain energy. Sleep experts believe that at least seven to eight hours of sleep is the optimum amount for adults. ARCHBISHOP CARLSON HOLDS LISTENING SESSION ON CATHOLIC EDUCATION

On Tuesday, October 5, there was a listening session held at Trinity High School with Archbishop Carlson in attendance. Every parish in the Northeast Deanery was represented.

Parishioners chose one of three topics to discuss :finance, enrollment or Catholic Identity. The questions that were discussed were:

- 1. How can we strengthen our school's Catholic Identity?
- 2. How can we increase the number of students in our schools?
- 3. How can we make our school financially sound and, at the same time, help those who otherwise could not afford a Catholic school education?

After table discussion around these questions each group was asked to share two ideas that came from the discussion with the whole group and the Archbishop. After hearing the ideas of each group an open mike session was held with the parishioners asking questions of the Archbishop.

Archbishop Carlson's vision for Catholic schools is that they truly be "Alive In Christ". He believes for this to happen three important things must be present. (1) Schools must have a vibrant Catholic Identity; (2) Schools enrollment must be growing; and (3) Schools must be financially sound, and at the same time, provide assistance to those who cannot afford a Catholic School education. Through this meeting the Archbishop was inviting lay parish representatives to share their best advice on how best to achieve his three priorities for Catholic schools. He will be taking what was suggested at these meeting back to a education commission he established to keep our schools "Alive in Christ"
