Democracy Needs Virtue—Democracy Needs You

EARS AGO WHEN I WAS TEACHING FIFTH GRADERS about salvation history I learned something about the gift of conscience that I never knew before. Salvation history traces the history of God's faithful and generous love for all people, through all times. A love that the People of God—the Church—are called to proclaim "to the ends of the Earth" and "until

the end of time". This kind of love is possible and promising because it's rooted in **the covenant** between God and the People—**deep**, **mutual love for each other**. Even before fifth grade children know how to love like this. So our text book proposed that we use these **words** to **look for salvation history** today and to **learn how to make it happen** more often.

THINK

Why am I here? What needs to be done?

REMEMBER

What has experience taught me? What better choices do I have?

CHOOSE

What different decision can I make? How long do I have to decide?

ACT

What am I going to do? When? Who can help me?

After a few weeks of applying these questions in their everyday lives, one of my students asked, "Father, what's your conscience?" Now I had never used the word in class. It was not in their textbooks or even the teacher's guide. But as soon as I heard the word, I knew that this was what we'd been talking about all these weeks.

In that class we talked a lot about this student's insight and what it meant for us and for the future. I felt some sadness that as a child I'd mostly been taught about "conscience" as something inside us all that "keeps us out of trouble". This student help me to remember—even finally learn—that "conscience" is "a positive, God-given creative power for creating and re-creating our own lives and our world".

The following year, with a new class of children, another student said, "Father, we have to add another word to the list!" Turning the class over to her, she explained that "after doing all these things we have to"

WAIT

What happened? What can or should I do different?

I often wonder what our world would look like today if I could have kept those two very insightful classes of fifth graders together for the past 30 years!?

Conscience is a part of every election cycle—not simply as an exercise of **individual judgment**, but as a practice of **decision-making within** and by a community.

"Democracy needs virtue ...

A LITTLE SALT

WON'T HURT

The average American consumes about 1-3 teaspoons of salt a day. Your body needs sodium for many functions; however, healthy adults should limit their sodium to about 1/4 teaspoon of salt per day. Reducing the amount of sodium you consume may help to reduce or avoid high blood pressure. That's important because those with high blood pressure are more likely to develop heart disease and have a stroke.

Most foods in their natural state contain sodium. But most sodium in our diet is added to food while it is being commercially processed or prepared at home.

When buying prepared and packaged foods, read the labels. Watch for the words "soda" and "sodium" and the symbol "Na" on labels.


Controlling your sodium intake doesn't need to spoil the pleasure of a restaurant meal, but order selectively. Consider these tips for meals:

- Don't use the salt shaker. Use the pepper shaker.
- Be familiar with lower sodium foods.
- Try adding fresh lemon to fish and vegetables.

Foods in their "natural" setting are very tasty. So, give your heart, your pressure and most of all your general health a treat by going easy on the salt shaker.


