Sacrament of Marriage

Engaged couples begin preparation for the Sacrament of Marriage at least 6 months before their wedding. Please remember—a wedding date will not be scheduled until the assessment of their readiness for the Sacrament of Marriage has been completed. Contact the rectory for more information. Weddings are not scheduled during the Season of Lent.

Anointing of the Sick

The sacrament is for those having surgery, the seriously ill, the chronically ill, and those near death. If you know in advance that you are going to the hospital, call one of the priests to arrange for anointing at home or church. In addition the sacrament is celebrated at church on the first Saturday of the month after evening Mass and on the third Sunday of the month after 8:00 Mass. It may be repeated as needed.

UR SCRIPTURES FOR MASS DURING ORDINARY TIME explore the mission and ministry of Jesus. A few days ago at Mass I asked everyone this question, "What was the greatest challenge Jesus had to face during his years of ministry?" I gave everyone a little time to think about it, but still no one got the right answer. "Success!" Not that he didn't enjoy

Certainly Jesus and his disciples needed rest. The practice of "sabbath" is essential to practicing our faith. But "settling down" is not! Success always tempts us to settle down.

Take some time this week to think about this—to pray about it yourself. To be baptized is to be **on mission.** Being on mission is also one of the best ways other people have for recognizing that you are a Christian and a Catholic. Our works of service within and outside of the community of the Church are a witness to faith.

- that the presence of our Youth **Group** in Washington DC for the Pro-Life March will strengthen our nation to value the gift of life more than anything else

The **goals** of this program are to help priests learn to minimize the frustration and energy spent on their administrative roles and to maximize the joy and time spent on the pastoral duties for which they were uniquely ordained. This week Redemptorist Father David Polek will celebrate Mass at 8:00am (Tuesday-Friday). Since Monday is a civil holiday, Mass will be at **9:00am**. Please pray for the personal and professional growth of all the priests participating in this program, and for their many years of future service in our Church.



Seniors—you may be eligible for a refund of a portion of your real estate taxes or rent if you meet the following qualifications:

- Either age 65 or 100% disabled and between 18-64 or widowed person between 60-64 receiving Social Security surviving spouse benefits.
- As a homeowner, your TOTAL household income was below \$30,000 for a single person or \$34,000 for a married couple.
- As a renter, your TOTAL household income was less than \$27,500 for a single person or \$29,500 for a married couple.
- You lived in Missouri for the entire year.
- You paid real estate taxes or rent on your main homestead.
- You DO NOT rent from a non-profit organization.

You may be eligible for as much as \$1100 in refunds as a homeowner and \$750 in refunds as a renter, depending on what you paid in 2010 and your income.

Prior to October 31st your cancelled checks for Sunday contributions, Holy Days, or special collections will serve as your record. Regrettably prior to this date we will not be able to substantiate your cash contributions made using your parish envelopes.

Finally, we will substantiate with an acknowledgement letter every single contribution of \$250 or more when you provide us with a copy of your cancelled check(s).
