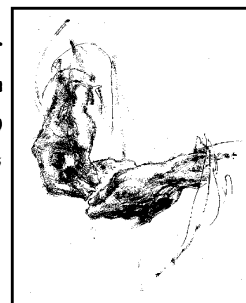

Sacrament of Marriage

Please remember—a wedding date will not be scheduled until the assessment of their readiness for the Sacrament of Marriage has been completed. Contact the rectory for more information. Weddings are not scheduled during the Season of Lent. Anointing of the Sick

The sacrament is for those having surgery, the seriously ill, the chronically ill, and those near death. If you know in advance that you are going to the hospital, call one of the priests to arrange for anointing at home or church. In addition the sacrament is celebrated at church on the first Saturday of the month after evening Mass and on the third Sunday of the month after 8:00 Mass. It may be repeated as needed.

Faith and Religion That Make A Difference Things We Know By Heart

LAST WEEK THE FOLLOWING ANNOUNCEMENT caught my attention at the airport. “Will departing passenger Kramer please return to the security checkpoint for your daughter!” The urgency of the situation required repeating the message four times. Each time the busy concourse became more quiet with disbelief and presumably genuine concern.

We humans have a natural fear of being “left behind” or abandoned. When a child wanders off in a store and then realizes mom or dad has “disappeared”, frantic terror sets in. When we lose track of one another because of the rush or responsibilities of life, we may deeply regret losing touch with our commitments and those we care about most. And no one likes standing alone in their convictions about what’s really important.

As we listen to and celebrate today St. Matthew’s passion story of Jesus I find it curious that for such a long a story—the longest of all the Gospels—Matthew has Jesus speak only one sentence: “**My God, why have you forsaken me?**” These words are from Psalm 22, a powerful lament of one who intensely experiences and praises God for coming to the poor person who hoped for salvation. It becomes Jesus’ prayer of unrestrained appreciation and love in what may seem to us to be his darkest hour.

Jesus’ choice to give his life for our salvation meant abandoning himself into the arms of God who promises life out of death. What we celebrate on Palm Sunday and during all of Holy Week—indeed, all of Christian life—is the call to unite ourselves with Jesus in his act of trust and self-giving.

Dear friends,

*by works of charity and self-sacrifice
we have been preparing
for the celebration
of the Lord’s paschal mystery.
This week we come together
in union with the whole Church
throughout the world
to celebrate these mysteries.*

*Let us remember with devotion
Jesus saving work
and follow him with a lively faith.
United with him
in his suffering on the cross,
may we share his resurrection and
new life.*

Jesus’ abandonment always makes me stop and think. It’s a mystery I want to understand and be inspired by more than fear. Jesus was not a victim of accident or the evil intentions of others. He chose to die that we might live.

THE LIFE AND MISSION OF OUR PARISH hinges on our own willingness for self-abandonment for the good of others in union with Jesus. Our cultural convictions make it hard for us to appreciate the passion story. Suffering is a nuisance and pain we can and want to readily avoid by cleverness and medicine. It’s hard to admire endurance in difficulty. Logic and self-preservation have too much become the criteria of belief. The significance of being raised by God from the dead, of being restored to honor after shameful crucifixion, is hard to imagine.

Most of us know the passion story by heart. We know it **from memory**. We been taught it and parts of it we know are true and don’t have to think twice about. We know it **from experience** that has formed our understanding and fuels our passion for living. And, honestly, we’ve all **doubted this story** because of temptation, fear, or failure. During these days of Holy Week **let’s continue to ask how we can imitate Jesus’ obedience** without panic or fear of abandonment, and with courage based on absolute trust put our lives and our parish into the hands of God.

INFLAMMATION: What Is It and How Does It Help

Part 3 of 3

Have you determined yet if inflammation is your best friend or worst enemy? A little more information may be necessary to help you decide. This 3rd installment may help you determine if inflammation is good or bad for you.

3. It's not the look of your body fat, but what's inside it that really hurts you.

Ever wonder why obesity is linked to so many damaging diseases. Over the past five years, researchers have discovered that being overweight is a huge contributing factor to inflammation. Having too many extra fat cells basically amps up the inflammatory process; that's because fat cells are producers of hormones and hormones signal the immune system. Belly fat is more dangerous than fat in the hips and rear, because belly fat tends to produce more hormones.

What can you do? Aim for a healthier weight and keep moving, as in exercise. Exercise produces endorphins which help us feel good and encourage us to continue this immune boosting activity.

4. & 5. Watch out for stress and allergies.

Certain agents in the air can set off the inflammatory process as well as certain situations we get into, especially embarrassing or uncomfortable situations. When our faces get flushed or we get sweating palms or our hearts race, we begin the inflammatory process.

Emotional stress in small doses is no great deal, but when we are stressed all the time, we can put our inflammatory defenses into overdrive. To lower your stress, get outside and enjoy the sun and the trees and all the wonders God has given us and get plenty of sleep.

Undiagnosed allergies can also be the underlying cause of several conditions that can activate the inflammatory process. Many times when something is bothering us or we are not feeling very well, we go to the doctor and he/she puts us on medicine. They don't always look at the true nature of the new symptoms and why they may be occurring.

Know your body and pay attention to what it is trying to tell you. If you start feeling a certain way and suspect a particular food as the triggering factor, eliminate it from your diet for about two weeks and notice if you begin to feel better.

All these factors can put the inflammatory process in motion and inflammation will either stop after a certain time (acute=good) or keep going (chronic=bad). These episodes of inflammation help us stay in tune with our bodies and help us determine what is healthy for our bodies.

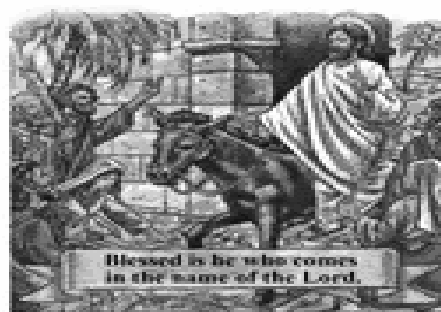
