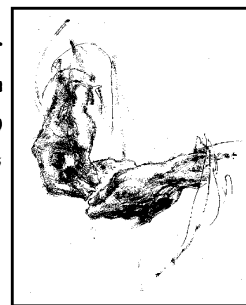

### Sacrament of Marriage

Engaged couples begin preparation for the Sacrament of Marriage at least 6 months before their wedding. Please remember—a wedding date will not be scheduled until the assessment of their readiness for the Sacrament of Marriage has been completed. Contact the rectory for more information. Weddings are not scheduled during the Season of Lent. Anointing of the Sick

The sacrament is for those having surgery, the seriously ill, the chronically ill, and those near death. If you know in advance that you are going to the hospital, call one of the priests to arrange for anointing at home or church. In addition the sacrament is celebrated at church on the first Saturday of the month after evening Mass and on the third Sunday of the month after 8:00 Mass. It may be repeated as needed.

### If You See Something Say Something The Mystery / Problem of Incarnation

**THOMAS AND PHILIP HAVE A BIG PROBLEM**—the birth of Jesus as Son of God and son of Mary. But they're not alone. The mystery of it all was one of the hardest things for the early Church to understand or talk about. In one sense it might be easier to believe in Easter—life after death—than Christmas. Christmas has more consequences.

If we say we believe in the humanity of God and that God chose to become a part of human history, then we're going to find it much harder to excuse ourselves from getting involved in each other's lives. God has made each of us in all our humanity—mind, heart, body, and soul—to be an instrument of grace, a sacrament of the continuing power and presence of Christ. God believes the world is redeemable—all creation, every person, daily history. How can I not believe this, and still believe in God?!

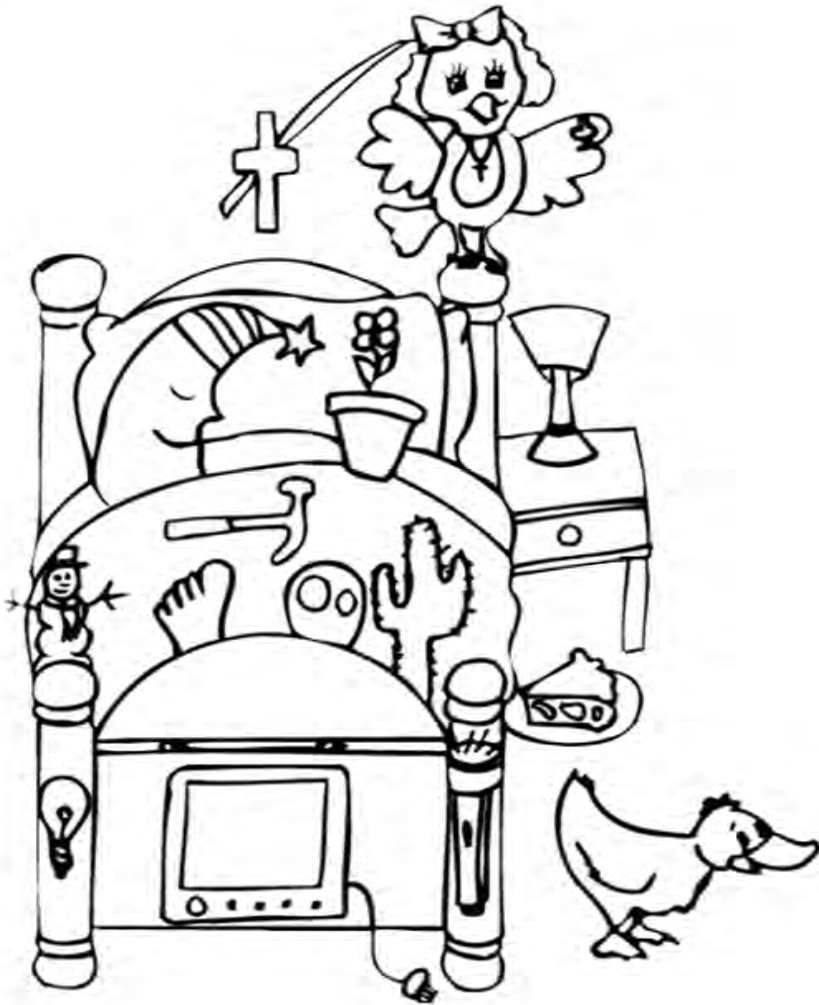

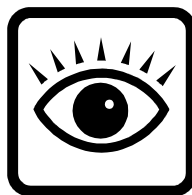

## 10 TIPS FOR AGING HEALTHY EYES

As we grow older we experience weaker vision. Problems such as glaucoma, cataracts, age related macular degeneration and diabetic retinopathy are common among older adults. We can't prevent our eyes from aging but we can slow down the age related damage by taking care of our eyes.

- **Get regular eye exams:** Starting at age 40 an annual eye exam can pick up signs of glaucoma.
- **Wear sunglasses:** The ultraviolet rays from sun can cause damage to the eyes like cataracts and possible acceleration of macular degeneration.
- **Wear a hat:** Wear a wide brimmed hat when outdoors for long periods.
- **Fruits and vegetables:** Research shows that eating fruits and vegetables with yellow and orange pigments like corn, squash, carrots plus dark green leafy vegetables like spinach help lower the risk of eye conditions that accompany aging.
- **Multivitamins:** Vitamins A,C, and E plus the mineral zinc help promote eye health.
- **Stop smoking:** Smoking promotes eye disease by reducing blood flow to the eyes.
- **Shed some light:** Reading and working in a dimly lit room causes eyestrain.
- **Take a Break:** Prevent eyestrain by looking away from book or computer screen for 10 seconds every 15 minutes.
- **Don't ignore warning signs:** Many serious problems can be treated if caught early. See the doctor for any changes such as blurred or double vision, pain in eyes or problems with glares.

Our eyes are the windows to the world....try hard to keep them "clean".

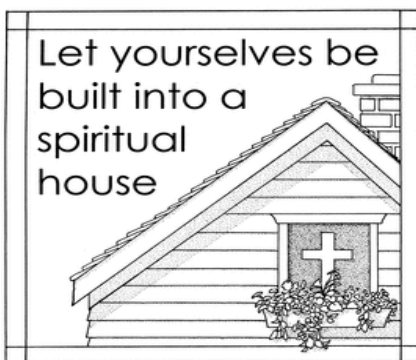
