Sacrament of Marriage

Engaged couples begin preparation for the Sacrament of Marriage at least 6 months before their wedding. Please remember—a wedding date will not be scheduled until the assessment of their readiness for the Sacrament of Marriage has been completed. Contact the rectory for more information. Weddings are not scheduled during the Season of Lent.

Anointing of the Sick

The sacrament is for those having surgery, the seriously ill, the chronically ill, and those near death. If you know in advance that you are going to the hospital, call one of the priests to arrange for anointing at home or church. In addition the sacrament is celebrated at church on the first Saturday of the month after evening Mass and on the third Sunday of the month after 8:00 Mass. It may be repeated as needed.

If You See Something Say Something

Can God Be Trusted? — The New Testament Question

BOTTOM LINE—Jesus wanted his disciples to be different than the world they lived in and then promised that being different can change the world. But can you trust a person who talks like this? Who lives this way? Jesus' disciples faced two troublesome questions. First, was Jesus telling the **truth?** In their world people typically used secrecy, deception, and even lies

to protect their honor. It was difficult to know the truth. Even Jesus had to assure them that he was not deceiving them or lying. So he calls on God to be his witness and promises that God will "Advocate" on their behalf. They are to believe and teach others that no one ever again has to pretend to be someone they're not.

They also had to deal with this question: Is it safe to act like the whole world is your family? In their culture—which was conflict prone everyone outside one's large and very extended family was suspected of being an enemy. Only to your family and kin, maybe your village, did you owe the truth. Jesus clearly extends the boundaries of love beyond family and village, challenging them to face this basic cultural hostility toward non-kin and even to forgive those who take hostile action against them.

I think we all still have these questions. The fruits of the Holy Spirit (Galatians 6:22-23) are signs that we are facing these questions and that God continues to "Advocate" on our behalf as well.








BECOME YOUR OWN *HEALTH*AND *WELLNESS* EXPERT

How important is it to be educated on just the basics of health care? VERY! Consider it an investment to know and understand basic and at times, detailed definitions of health and wellness terms. Also, be educated on explanations and facts on who, what and where your health and wellness experiences may begin. But don't stop at just educating yourself on basic terms, know the credentials to ask for from your health care providers and ask what the credentials mean and research particular items or information. Health care providers and entities should be given great respect for what they do, but you should demand that same respect for your own health and wellness.

LET'S LEARN SOME COMMON DEFINITIONS:

Advance Health Care Directives—— This allows an individual to appoint someone of their choosing who will have power of attorney to make decisions on their behalf, and give instructions about their health care wishes that include treatment if the individual becomes incapacitated from an accident or illness. This is also known as a "living will".

Baby Boomers—Those individuals born between the years of 1945 and 1964. The first of the 77 million of them turned 65 this past January. **Estate Planning**——The preparation of a plan of administration and disposition of one's property before or after death, to include wills, power of attorney, trusts, etc. This is beneficial for those who may have to enter a long term skilled nursing facility

Geriatrics——-The care of aged individuals.
Gerontology——The study of aging. The address of all aspects of how aging affects individuals physically, socially, psychologically and economically.
Residential Care Facility/Assisted Care Facility——These facilities offer people a place to live that allows them the chance to remain somewhat independent, yet provides the residents with various levels of assistance. These facilities help those who cannot live completely on their own in a community but do not need nursing home care.


