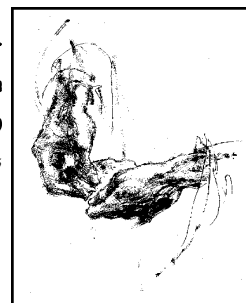

Sacrament of Marriage

Engaged couples begin preparation for the Sacrament of Marriage at least 6 months before their wedding. Please remember—a wedding date will not be scheduled until the assessment of their readiness for the Sacrament of Marriage has been completed. Contact the rectory for more information. Weddings are not scheduled during the Season of Lent.

Anointing of the Sick

The sacrament is for those having surgery, the seriously ill, the chronically ill, and those near death. If you know in advance that you are going to the hospital, call one of the priests to arrange for anointing at home or church. In addition the sacrament is celebrated at church on the first Saturday of the month after evening Mass and on the third Sunday of the month after 8:00 Mass. It may be repeated as needed.

We Are What We Eat

AT THE HEART OF ST. JOHN'S "BREAD OF LIFE" discourse we learn that **Jesus' gift of bread** is the gift of **his teaching** and the gift of **himself**. Believing in the gift of Jesus as living bread challenges us to move beyond simply trying to **understand** this mystery and to **take a "great leap of faith"**. Participation in the sacrament of the Eucharist draws us into the very **life of Jesus** and through his mission into **eternal life**.

By eating this Body and drinking this Blood, **we make the commitment of taking on Jesus' consciousness, he values, his way of living and relating**. Like Jesus, we must be **"living bread"**, choosing to lay down our own lives for others. More often than not, this self-giving happens through small, seemingly inconsequential acts of kindness. Paradoxically, this **self-giving does not empty us but fills us** with the very life—eternal life!—of Jesus.

It would be a good day to ask ourselves how we've been **blessed to eat "living bread"**. And then to ask, how have we been challenged—how are we **now challenged—to be bread, broken and shared for others**. Only in this way do we discover—and not diminish—the sacred sign of the bread of life. We become what we celebrate!

CONGRATULATIONS from our parish community to **Teirra** and **Alanna Andrisse** who next weekend will be celebrating with us their **1st Holy Communion**. They've recently completed their preparation for this sacrament as students of the **Parish School of Religion** program jointly sponsored by the parishes of our Deanery. With their parents—William and Angela—and younger sister, Asia, they've been active members of our parish for the past several years. Please join me in celebrating with them and in congratulating them on this important step on their **journey of faith**. May they and many others be truly blessed in the welcome they receive from each member of our parish.

YOUR GENEROUS SUPPORT

for the food distribution programs of our parish and our archdiocese are greatly appreciated. These programs reach the most vulnerable people in our community. Earlier this month I received an **URGENT ALERT** from Catholic Charities that **Missouri's Food Pantry Tax Credit** program will expire on **August 28th**. Pantries across Missouri are worried about the loss of donations of food and money.

Through this program **donors** are able to **claim half of the value of their donation—up to \$2,500 a year**—as credit against their state income tax bill. Through this program the state offers \$2 million a year to encourage donations of food and money.

From what I have learned this incentive program got lost in all the squabbling over the \$522 million worth of tax credits handed out by the state last year. The **Food Pantry Tax Credit will not be restored** without a special session of the legislature this summer which does not seem likely.

This program has grown significantly over the past 4 years with 99% of the donors being individual tax payers, claiming credits on average amounting to \$450. 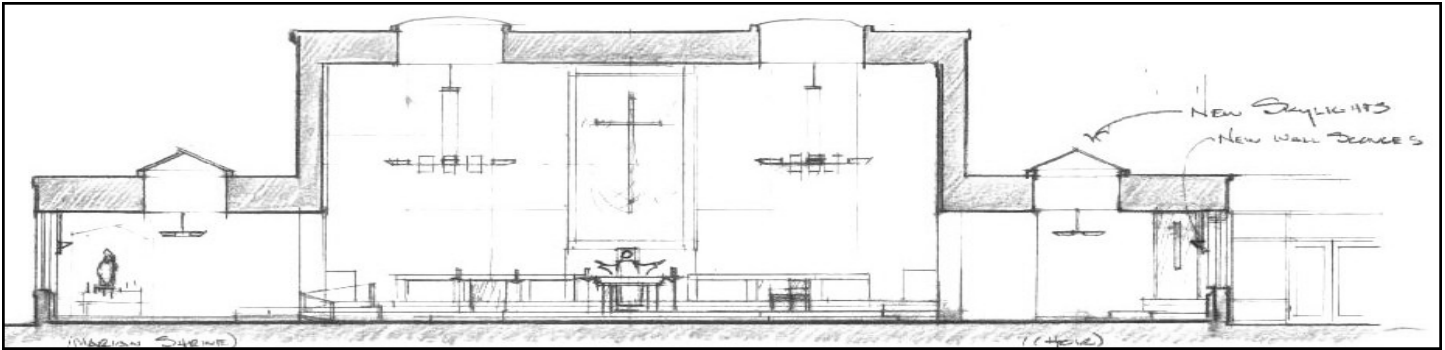

Public Presentations Scheduled for Our Parish in June
Renovation Plans for Our Church & Community Center



After our Visioning Day in 2008 and a Parish Survey the following year our Parish Pastoral Council commissioned a Church Renovation Committee to “... review the design of our Church building to enhance worship, to create a space for fellowship, and to achieve accessibility for those with physical limitations.” The Committee has now nearly finished its work.

WHAT WE VALUE

In January the Renovation Committee presented its work to a group of 38 parish leaders who met to **determine the benefits of this project for our parish.** They agreed that the proposed plans -

Sacramentary = Roman Missal

The Sacramentary is the “big red book” that the priest uses at his chair and altar during Mass. This book contains the prayers and rubrics for the clergy and laity. This book has undergone revisions in its translations-this is the reason for the changes. After Vatican II, when the Mass went into the vernacular-the translation was done in what is called a “sense” translation. The Latin words were translated to a word that was commonly used by people, and not necessarily a “direct” word translation. Today, the changes we will see is a direct translation of the Latin word into English. The translations are also based in scripture. Several scripture passages will be cited in the next couple of weeks, as we talk about the specific translations.

And you ask why did this have to happen? Aren’t the words we use now good enough? Answer or phrase next week!

7 RESOURCES FOR ALZHEIMER'S HELP WHERE TO FIND INFORMATION AND SUPPORT FOR DEMENTIA CARE.

Coping with a loved one's dementia symptoms can be stressful beyond belief. Whether symptoms are caused by Alzheimer's or another form of dementia, knowing what to expect and what you can do to help—while getting the emotional support you need—can greatly improve the quality of care you offer and help preserve your health and sanity.

Here are seven resources available to those caring for someone with dementia:

1. Your local Area Agency on Aging

This is a government-mandated clearinghouse for general information about nearby eldercare services. This agency should be your first call because they know the lay of the land on eldercare in your community. They know what kind of programs, facilities and expertise is available in your community.

2. Caring.com Steps & Stages

This is a first-of-its-kind, online resource for Alzheimer's care that walks families through everything they'll encounter while coping with a loved one's dementia. This is helpful because Caring.com's stage-based Steps & Stages simplifies the challenge by tailoring advice to the point that a loved one's condition is right now.

3. The Alzheimer's Association

It was founded in 1980 as the first national organization devoted to advancing Alzheimer's disease awareness and research. Local chapters provide handy ways for caregivers or the newly diagnosed to tap into support groups, educational programs or the ability to connect with local experts.

4. Local dementia support groups

These are usually small groups of people sharing common experiences under the guidance of a trained expert or a fellow caregiver. These help caregivers feel less isolated, both physically and emotionally.

5. The Alzheimer's Disease Education and Referral Center

This is the government's consumer information center about Alzheimer's disease. It is a good place to start an action plan to cope with memory loss.

6. The Family Caregiver Alliance

The Family Caregiver Alliance focuses on education, services, research and advocacy, they are the leading nonprofit organization that supports long-term family caregivers of all kinds. They offer tips sheets on topics such as family meetings and end-of-life choices.

7. Online support groups for caregivers

A newer twist on the conventional support group, online forums and chat groups provide the same kind of emotional understanding and practical advice sharing, without requiring participants to stick to a particular schedule or even travel from their homes. Connecting with other caregivers in the same boat provides an outlet to vent when needed—no saving up tales of woe for say, Thursdays at 7 p.m.

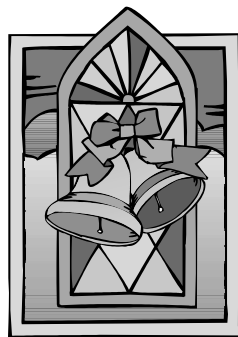
