

#### Sacrament of Marriage

Please remember—a wedding date will not be scheduled until the assessment of their readiness for the Sacrament of Marriage has been completed. Contact the rectory for more information. Weddings are not scheduled during the Season of Lent.

#### Anointing of the Sick

The sacrament is for those having surgery, the seriously ill, the chronically ill, and those near death. If you know in advance that you are going to the hospital, call one of the priests to arrange for anointing at home or church. In addition the sacrament is celebrated at church on the first Saturday of the month after evening Mass and on the third Sunday of the month after 8:00 Mass. It may be repeated as needed.

## Responding to the Invitation of Jesus to "Come" **Stepping Out of the Boat**

For many years I have believed that what than a transitional step to priesthood. All God has in mind for the work of our lives begins on the day we're born, but even more on the day of our baptism. For all of us baptism permanently and perfectly connects us with God through Jesus and with a faith community that will help us understand this connection and our place and purpose in the world. When these **connections** are **well in** place we experience the reign of God in our lives now - no matter our vocation or occupation. We know that everyone's life is a part of God's redemptive plan for all the world. We like Peter will actually ask Jesus to tell us to "get out of the boat" - never hesitating to cry out for his hand when we're afraid.

Today I'm happy to announce that a member of our parish, Bill Krenn, has been accepted as Candidate for the Permanent Diaconate in service to the Archdiocese of St. Louis. This fall he begins his Application Year, a time of informal association with the deacon program that provides more information, supports his discernment, and begins the earliest stages of formation.

Bill was born, baptized, and raised in Holy Family Parish (South St. Louis). Since then his life of faith and call to marriage have been nurtured through an active membership in the Newman Center of the University of Missouri St. Louis as well as several other parishes. Bill and his wife, Judy, who serves as our Youth Ministry Coordinator, have been married for 31 years. They have 4 adult children and several grandchildren. Bill now serves as chairperson for our Parish Finance Committee and is active in the work of our St. Vincent de Paul Society. Please keep Bill and Judy in your prayers as they continue to explore this calling in his life. For him and for all of us "stepping out of the boat" requires continuing faith in God.

#### The Ministry of the Deacon

The diaconate was established in the 1st century when the early Church recognized the great need for more teachers in the ways of faith and more ministers to serve the needs of others. This ministry flourished in our Church for more than 400 years before its decline, becoming eventually little more deacons share with bishops and priests in the sacrament of Holy Orders.

Our 2nd Vatican Council (1962-1965) proposed the restoration of the permanent diaconate which then occurred under the leadership of Pope Paul VI in 1976. In 1977 our Archdiocese began calling permanent deacons serve the Church of St. Louis. A two-year discernment and formation program was developed and put in place. Over the years based on the needs of candidates and of the Church deacons now have a five year program of preparation for their ministry.

#### **Liturgical Ministry**

The deacon is called to assist the priest at Mass, administer the sacrament of Baptism, witness and bless marriages, officiate at funerals and burial services, preside at Communion liturgies where a priest is not present. This service at the altar is a sign and symbol of our Church's commitment to parishes and communities.

#### Ministry of the Word

Deacons also proclaim the Gospel and may receive preparation and the authorization of the bishop to preach. Every deacon should endeavor to turn the Word into deed in his daily life.

#### **Ministry of Charity and Service**

Most importantly the ministry of love and justice is the heart of the diaconate. In St. Louis deacons serve in parishes and as hospital and prison chaplains, assist the homeless, minister to the divorced and widowed. In general, they counsel and serve those who are at the margins of our society. Their calling is not to move away from the world, but to become more involved in it.

# 10 VITAL THINGS TO LOOK FOR IN A STROKE CENTER

Do you have a parent that is at risk for a stroke, perhaps they have already had one or there is a strong family history. Or maybe a sibling or neighbor that have many risk factors for having a stroke, or even a member of our congregation. Regardless of who we know that may be at risk for a stroke or why they may be at risk, the most important thing is to be prepared for a stroke emergency. One element of preparation is determining in advance where your loved one will be taken if he/she is having a stroke.

The best treatment a person having a stroke can receive is at a primary stroke center, a hospital that has been certified by Joint Commission, a special committee for hospitals, as meeting the recommendations for primary stroke centers. To find a primary stroke center near you or your loved ones house, visit www.jointcommission.org or ask your physician.

To determine which of your local hospitals meet the important criteria, use these questions as a guideline.

#### **Stroke Center Questions**

- Does the hospital have a stroke response team available 24 hours a day, seven days a week?
- Are the hospital's emergency physicians specifically trained to diagnose and treat acute stroke?
- Are the emergency physicians capable of treating acute ischemic stroke patients with intravenous tPA within one hour of arrival to hospital?
- Is the tPA treatment available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week?
- Does the hospital offer coordinated stroke care beyond the evaluation in the emergency room?
- Is a neurosurgeon on call 24 hours a day, 7 days a week?
- Does the hospital have on staff someone who can perform and interpret brain imaging (CT scan or MRI) 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.
- Is the hospital laboratory open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.
- Does the hospital measure and track patient outcomes, conduct regular evaluations and improve programs accordingly?
- Does the hospital staff responsible for treating stroke patients receive at least 8 hours of continuing medical education each year?

If distance is not on your side, then get them to the <u>near</u>est hospital. When it comes to strokes, time is critical.

# Archdiocesan Guidelines for the Use of Beverage Alcohol

These *Guidelines* were developed for all parishes, parish organizations, and agencies of the Archdiocese. There are occasions when it is appropriate to include alcohol as part of parish functions, always in accordance with legal requirements.

A vibrant parish community is welcoming and hospitable without ignoring or minimizing the moral values at the heart of our Catholic faith.

However, parish leaders also have a serious responsibility to promote strong moral values and to protect those who are most vulnerable, especially our children and youth.

- All federal, state and local laws and ordinances must be observed. This includes regulations required for the sale of alcohol, prohibiting the distribution of alcohol to minors and not serving alcohol to intoxicated persons.
- 2. The group or organization sponsoring an activity or event at which alcoholic beverages are to be served must have permission from the pastor of the parish or the director of the agency that hosts the event or activity.
- 3. Alcoholic beverages and food containing alcohol must be clearly labeled or identified as such.
- 4. Alcoholic beverages that are designed to facilitate rapid alcohol consumption, including grain alcohol and shots, are prohibited.
- 5. Whenever alcohol is served, non-alcoholic alternatives must <u>always</u> be offered <u>with equal accessibility</u>.
- 6. The serving or use of alcoholic beverages at events should not be "actively marketed" during the event.
- It is preferable that <u>alcohol not to be served to anyone or brought in by someone, including adults, at any event directed primarily to and for minors. This includes elementary and high school events, CYC events, Scouting activities, etc.</u>
- 8. All adults should be mindful of their Christian responsibility to drink in moderation and to give a good example to our youth.

"Clergy, employees and volunteers should never be involved with the illegal possession and/or illegal use of drugs and/or alcohol. They must never supply such substances to minors nor may they consume alcohol while functioning in an official capacity with minors. This includes those who are involved with children as coaches or managers of sports teams."

Code of Ethical Conduct for

#### A message from Archbishop Carlson

Many of us know acquaintances, friends and even family members who have drifted away from or actively left the Catholic Church. It pains us when we reflect on their separation from the Church. We wish them the joy we have found in loving Jesus Christ and His Church through our participation in the sacraments, the liturgy and our Roman Catholic way of life.

Can you identify members of your family, friends or fellow parishioners who no longer practice their faith? Are you praying for them? Have you invited them to come to Mass with you? If they came back, would they feel welcome? Is there more that we can do to encourage our absent sisters and brothers to come home?

Beginning in Advent of 2011, the Catholic Church in the 11 counties that are served by the Archdiocese of St. Louis will undertake a dramatic new initiative to welcome back our brothers and sisters who have been away from the Church. Catholics Come Home is a collaborative effort of parish initiatives coupled with a regional media campaign of television commercials.
