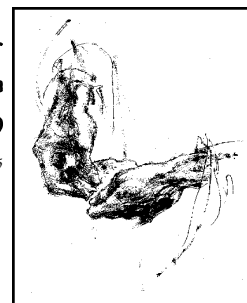

Sacrament of Marriage

Engaged couples begin preparation for the Sacrament of Marriage at least 6 months before their wedding. Please remember—a wedding date will not be scheduled until the assessment of their readiness for the Sacrament of Marriage has been completed. Contact the rectory for more information. Weddings are not scheduled during the Season of Lent.

Anointing of the Sick

The sacrament is for those having surgery, the seriously ill, the chronically ill, and those near death. If you know in advance that you are going to the hospital, call one of the priests to arrange for anointing at home or church. In addition the sacrament is celebrated at church on the first Saturday of the month after evening Mass and on the third Sunday of the month after 8:00 Mass. It may be repeated as needed.

Becoming a More Evangelizing Parish Believing is Seeing

QUESTION. HOW DID JONAH GET TO NINEVEH? It's a trick question, so think carefully beyond what childhood memory might suggest. One's quick response might be by means of a "big fish", a whale. But the more insightful answer might be that he got there because the respectful, but discerning crew members threw him out of the boat for not doing what God wanted. Jonah didn't want to go to Nineveh because the place had a bad reputation. He couldn't see the goodness of those people, that place, and couldn't imagine why God would want to be concerned. Why should he cooperate?

Not believing in the goodness of the people of Nineveh made it harder for Jonah to see it. So, he just gave up. I'm sure there's a warning for all of us here, not the least of which might be this: If God wants me to learn something or do something, God cares enough about me - and others - to find a way to make that happen.

Metanoia ... means a change of mentality.

*It is not simply a matter of thinking differently in an intellectual sense,
but of revising the reasons behind one's actions
in the light of the Gospel.*

We hear today St. Mark writing to the Romans - and to us - that, **"This is the time of fulfillment."**, and Paul to the Corinthians that **"... time is running out."** In Jesus, the Christ, God continues to call followers to cooperate in a mission to bring about the Reign of God. Everyday is a day of fulfillment, if we want it to be. Broken relationships are being healed. Someone in need is being helped. Strangers and aliens are being accepted. Forgiveness is being offered and received. The dignity of every person is being respected.

Moving forward, **toward** challenging places or painful people presumes that I believe in their goodness in the eyes of God - and in my own goodness. Believing, I will see it more easily in places I'd possibly rather not be and in people I might otherwise never want or even try to associate with.

Curiously the story tells us that it was Jonah's own idea to be thrown out of the boat. And the ship's crew prayed hard to know they were doing the right thing. Mysteriously, once they did it, the chaos of the storm came to an end and Nineveh gets saved.

PAIN.....EVERYBODY GETS IT, NOBODY LIKES IT 10 WAYS TO HELP YOU DESCRIBE PAIN

Many times when we are in pain, it can be difficult to talk about and not easy to describe. If we are caring for a loved one or an elderly neighbor, it is even more difficult for them to talk about pain. "It really hurts" usually isn't enough for the doctor to figure out what is happening. Pain is subjective. Some people feel it more intensely or in different ways than others. Many elderly believe they are always supposed to have some sort of pain, so many don't complain. To help communicate our pain or our loved ones pain more effectively to the doctor, use this check list to keep a record of the reported pain or discomfort. Recording the answers to each of the questions will help the doctor or medical professional treat the pain more successfully.

1. Where is the pain located? (Have them point to the exact spot if possible.)
2. Can you describe the pain? Is it a sharp stab? A dull ache? Does it feel more like the cramp of a stomachache or the throb of a headache?
3. How would you rate the intensity of the pain on a scale of 1 (least) to 10 (most)?
4. What makes the pain feel better?
5. What makes the pain feel worse?
6. How quickly or slowly does the pain come on? Is it sudden or gradual?
7. How long does the pain last? Does it stay until you take medication, or does it go away on its own, even for a short while?
8. If the pain is intermittent, how often does it occur? (If necessary, clock it or help your loved one clock it. Write down the time it starts and when it stops.)
9. In what ways does the pain interfere with normal daily activities? Can you sleep? Can you eat? Can you walk?
10. Can you describe exactly how well your medication works? How quickly does it relieve the pain? Does it make the pain go away entirely, or just partially? How long does it last?

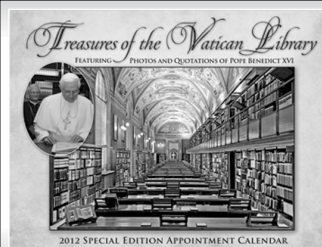

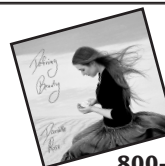
