

Sacrament of Marriage

Engaged couples begin preparation for the Sacrament of Marriage at least 6 months before their wedding. Please remember—a wedding date will not be scheduled until the assessment of their readiness for the Sacrament of Marriage has been completed. Contact the rectory for more information. Weddings are not scheduled during the Season of Lent.

Anointing of the Sick

The sacrament is for those having surgery, the seriously ill, the chronically ill, and those near death. If you know in advance that you are going to the hospital, call one of the priests to arrange for anointing at home or church. In addition the sacrament is celebrated at church on the first Saturday of the month after evening Mass and on the third Sunday of the month after 8:00 Mass. It may be repeated as needed.

Celebrating the Eucharist as a Way of Life You Are What You Eat and Drink

AS WE CELEBRATE TODAY'S FEAST take some time to consider a few of the times and ways in which someone you know - or even a stranger - has "laid down" or "pour out" their life for you. This may have happened in some dramatic or quite ordinary way. You may not have seen it coming and so were surprised. You may have experienced it for years. This kind of love is hard to explain. It's a mystery. Only over time does its meaning unfold, become more clear. Love like this is also humbling. It leaves you speechless, filled with gratitude. Eventually we learn that "imitating" such love is the only really satisfying way to "pay back" or "pay forward" what has been received. As with the bread and wine we eat and drink through our sharing in the Eucharist Jesus blesses and gives us to a world in need of healing, nourishment, and new life. Called to the table of the Lord we are transformed that we my become life-giving bread and saving cup for the world.

EXPLORING THE POWER of

"connections" is a spiritual exercise designed to help you remember your "baptismal character" - who you really are since the day of your baptism - and the "character of our community" as we gather for and live the Eucharist.

First, make a short visit to each of the holy water fonts in church and read about one of "characteristics" of a Christian person or community.

Remember, baptism is not only about how we "got into the Church" but who we are "called to be" for as long as we live. Then, spend just a few moments remembering the people who have helped you know and value the importance of these things in your life.

Do I invite our parish at them to contour to those when about why come to M around me

In what oth power and "I am with for others?

Finally, ask yourself with whom do I share these values? Who am I passing them on to? What are the "connections" I have or make everyday that demonstrate the power of my Baptism and our celebrations of the Eucharist?

Ask yourself:

Do I invite neighbors and friends to our parish activities? Or encourage them to come to Mass? Offer a ride to those who need one? Do I talk about why it's important to me to come to Mass? Do I support people around me who suffer or struggle?

In what other ways do I make the power and promise of Jesus - "I am with you always" - a reality for others?

WHEN PARISHES WORK TOGETHER our Catholic Church has always been more effective and more widely known - and inevitably more attractive to those who are looking for a faith community. As of June 2nd our parish has raised \$45,548 in support of the charitable services, education programs, and pastoral care funded through our Archdiocesan Annual Catholic Appeal. The characteristic generosity of our parish gives me confidence that we will reach our goal of \$53,943 and 44 New Donors. Already 215 parish households have returned pledge cards in support of the Appeal and we now have 13 new donors (members who have never or not recently given). Thank you for your generosity, and thank God for the benefit from the Appeal that we will receive this year - \$200,000 for our school!



Feast of Corpus Christi

"Then he took a cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them and they all drank from it." MARK 14:23

Jesus, the perfect steward, gave thanks, just before He gave Himself to us completely for our salvation. He offered us the chance to drink from His cup. In Eucharist we meet Christ personally and, if we listen to Him, we will know what drinking from His cup means for each of us. Often it means our own sacrifice—giving up some of our time, talent and treasure to do His work on earth.

SACRIFICE

Today the Church focuses on the Eucharist. Today's readings remind us how connected to ancient blood sacrifices we are when offering our unbloody sacrifice. The reading from Exodus describes a solemn ritual designed so the Israelites would never forget their covenant with God. The reading from the Letter to the Hebrews turns us from those ancient animal sacrifices, the first efforts to worship the living God. Our sacrifice is the body and blood of the Son of God. Because of Christ we have a new covenant. The Gospel from Mark retells the establishment of that covenant, the familiar story of the Last Supper. Juxtaposed with the story of animal sacrifice as it is here, we are challenged to listen with new attention, to remember the great price paid for our salvation. Jesus gave his body and every drop of his blood for us.

FREE ELECTRONIC RECYCLING EVENT

The City of BN is partnering with WITS Inc., to sponsor a Free Electronic Recycling Event on Saturday, June 16, 2012. The event will take place at the BN City Hall parking lot, 9641 Bellefontaine Road from 9:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. WITS accepts almost everything that runs on electric or batteries and some small machinery that runs on gas. Here is a short list of some of the items you may bring to the event to recycle: computers (data on computers will go through a complete data destruction software program per DoD – Department of Defense or you may also request that your computer's hard drive be destroyed), monitors, printers, computer mice, office equipment, TV (all sizes), radios, phones, clocks, VCRs, satellite dishes, medical equipment, CDs, VHS tapes, lawn equipment and usable toys. There is a \$5.00 charge to recycle the following items: refrigerators, air conditioners, items that contain mercury, washers, dishwashers and furnaces. Items donated must be dropped off at the site - NO HOME OR OFFICE PICK UP AVAILABLE. Paints, chemicals, tires or household furniture will not be accepted.

All donations, including financial, are tax deductible. Tax letters are available upon request at the drop-off site.

SUMMERTIME YARDWORK

It's that time of year! Warm weather, sunny days, cool nightswho wouldn't love this time of year. Early mornings when the sun is not so high in the sky, we get outside and tend the garden or the yard, and pull weeds. We want our yard to look nice and well groomed.

A day or two after working in the garden or pulling weeds in the yard, you notice a rash on your arms or lower legs. What is the culprit? Most likely it is from poison ivy, also known as poison oak or sumac. This rash develops as an allergic reaction from touching the sap of these plants. This sap may be in the ashes of burned plants, on an animal or on other objects that came in contact with the plant, such as clothing, garden tools and/or sports equipment. Small amounts of sap can stay under a person's fingernails for several days unless it is deliberately removed with a very good cleaning.

The poisonous ingredient in these plants is the chemical URUSHIOL. This chemical can be found in the bruised roots, stems, flowers, leaves and fruit, as well as the pollen of poison ivy, oak and sumac.

COMMON SYMPTOMS

BLISTERS
BURNING SKIN
ITCHING
REDNESS OF THE SKIN
SWELLING

Symptoms can affect the eyes and mouth in addition to the skin.

HOME TREATMENT

Wash the area immediately with soap and water, this can prevent a reaction, but it must be done right after exposure. After washing hands thoroughly, flush out eyes with water. Wash clothing in hot, soapy water without other items. You may need an antihistamine, such as Benadryl or a steroid cream for the itching. If you feel you have gotten it in your eyes or mouth, please see you doctor immediately, otherwise, a typical skin rash will go away without any long term problems using calamine lotion, which dries up the rash.



TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

A new name for this feast, long known as Corpus Christi or "Body of Christ," points to an important recovery of Communion from the shared chalice, the Precious Blood, in the Roman Catholic liturgy. For many centuries, only the priest received from the chalice. Now, over the last forty years, the cup has been offered more frequently to the faithful. Sadly, perhaps because it is not offered at all Masses, or because people are free to pass by the offered cup, it can be seen by some as a "take it or leave it" option. Some important meanings surface, however, when we drink from the common cup, such as our desire to participate in the pouring out of Christ's love. Bread is the staff of life, eaten by necessity even in times of pain. Wine, on the other hand, is the mark of festivity, a pledge of joy, a sign of unity between our altar table and the banquet feast of heaven. The center of the Gospel today is Jesus speaking of the pouring out of his blood, and his offer of a cup of blessing to be shared as a sign of his love. There is no better response than to take and drink, and no better way to mark this feast.

Both the police and fire department urge you to call in and register for this life-saving service. The list is confidential and will not be shared with anyone. The RFPD also offers, "The File of Life." This is a small packet with a magnet that has room for all of your medical information and emergency contacts that should be kept on your refrigerator. In the event you need emergency medical attention and cannot speak for your self, the emergency responders have all your information. The File for Life is free. For more information call The Riverview Fire Protection District at 867-3889 or City of BN Police Department at 867-00080. Those not living in the BNPD area or RFPD should contact their districts.
