



26th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Anyone who gives you a cup of water to drink because you belong to Christ, amen, I say to you, will surely not lose his reward." MARK 9:41

Our Lord's comment about the simple gesture of giving a drink of water is a reminder of how Jesus taught That we would all be judged at the end of time. "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me. naked and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me." Matthew 25:35. Our service and sacrifice to our parish and the greater Church allows us to care for Jesus when He in hungry, thirsty, ill or in need.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Did you ever notice how often the angels are referred to during Mass? We commonly meet them in the Confiteor ("I ask blessed Mary, every virgin, all the angels and saints"), prefaces ("with angels and archangels and the whole company of heaven"), the Roman Canon ("we pray that your angel may take this sacrifice"), and Eucharistic Prayer IV ("countless hosts of angels stand before you to do your will"). Last week and this week angels abound as we celebrated Michael, Gabriel, and Raphael yesterday and will honor the Guardian Angels on October 2. September 29 was originally the feast day for Michael alone. Gabriel and Raphael joined him in the 1969 reform of the Church calendar. The celebration of the Guardian Angels has been observed since the sixteenth century in Spain. Pope Clement X assigned the feast to the first free day after St. Michael's in 1670, and there it has remained. Take some time this week to reflect on these, God's messengers and our

protectors, and maybe even celebrate with a little angel food cake!

Key to Trimming "Bad Fat"

A new study recently released that increasing daily soluble fiber intake may help you to lose dangerous, visceral fat. Visceral fat produces hormones and other substances linked to a host of chronic diseases.

We have essentially two kinds of fat; subcutaneous fat, found just under the skin and visceral fat, located deep in the belly that wraps around a persons vital organs. Researchers from Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center have found ways to hone in on this deep belly fat. That can be done by getting moderate amounts of regular exercise and eating more soluble fiber from vegetables, fruits and beans.

High rates of visceral fat have been associated with high blood pressure, diabetes and fatty liver disease. Making a few simple changes in diet and exercise can have a big health impact.

What is the difference between soluble fiber and insoluble fiber? Both fibers are important for health, digestion and preventing diseases, but they have different actions and soluble fiber is more important when it comes to visceral fat.

<u>Soluble Fiber</u>———This attracts water and turns to gel during digestion which then slows digestion. Soluble fiber is found in oat bran, barley, nuts, seeds, beans, lentils, peas, and some fruits and vegetables. Soluble fiber may help lower cholesterol, which may help prevent heart disease.

Insoluble Fiber——-This is found in foods such as wheat bran, vegetables and whole grains. This adds bulk to the stool and appears to help food pass more quickly through the stomach and intestines.

All fiber is important, increasing soluble fiber is the thing to do when you are battling belly fat. Researchers know that increasing soluble fiber in your diet reduces visceral fat, they just don't know how it works, and believe more research is needed to study the relationship between soluble fiber and these deep, belly fat deposits.

POLITICS AND OUR PARISH

I most certainly would encourage our parish members to **be active in this year's political process** by **becoming informed** concerning the issues, by **considering prayerfully your choices** – ones that will not only benefit you personally but also support the common good – and by **responsibly exercising your right to vote** in this year's election.

All political activity on parish property must conform with these "Guidelines on the Distribution of Political Literature and Materials". These guidelines respect the clear and specific Federal restrictions governing the participation of religious and non-profit organizations in the political process. Furthermore, they both invite and challenge candidates and political organizations to engage our parish members in conversation and open debate of the issues in a way that is civil and informative for all concerned.

The "leafleting" of cars or the use of lawn signs does not actively engage our community in the political process, and often are a nuisance or an offense to parish members. **EVERY PARISH MEMBER SHOULD KNOW THAT PERMISSION IS NEVER GIVEN FOR ANY OF THE ABOVE ACTIVITIES.** When these things do occur we will notify such persons or groups of our policy. Every parish member should do the same.

You may want to save the following "Guidelines" for your future reference or to pass them on to candidates or political groups for their information.

Guidelines on the Distribution of Political Literature and Materials

The First Amendment to the United States Constitution guarantees the right of all citizens to be involved in the political processes of our nation. Furthermore, it is a moral obligation of all persons – individuals and communities – to be attentive to how their decisions affect other people. We have the right and responsibility to be involved in the political conversations and elections that determine our forms of government and system of laws.

Historically the Catholic Church in the United States has conscientiously refused to participate in partisan politics, particularly the endorsement of individual political parties or candidates. At the same time, the Church has felt a keen responsibility to educate its members as well as the larger community regarding the moral and ethical dimensions of public policy.

Therefore —

Permission will not be given to any individual or group to distribute or place partisan political literature and/or materials on our church property, in particular, it is not permitted to place leaflets on vehicles or lawn signs on parish property which is considered only a "quasi-public area". Since our parish Community Center is a polling place these activities may take place only on election day near the entrances of the polling station.






