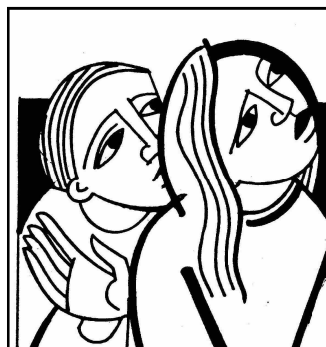

with the help of God,

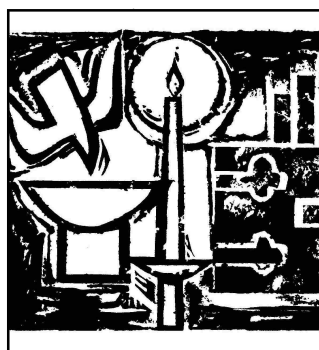

"ALL OF US ARE CHRISTIANS UNDER CONSTRUCTION."

Recently Archbishop Carlson reminded every Catholic of our Archdiocese to remember this. He then continued, *"it is absolutely important that we look for opportunities to invite others to join us, and join the ranks of others under 'construction'".* We are *"a Church under construction - not yet without spot or wrinkle but on the way."* This is the **journey**, the **adventure**, that Jesus in our Gospels is always setting out on with his disciples.

This week we began a **Year of Faith**, a time called by Pope Benedict XVI for strengthening our commitment to evangelization. This will be a year during which we need to remember our commission to go forth and proclaim the Gospel message.

"If we are to pass on to our children and grandchildren a way of life that is in harmony with God's plan for humanity, His plan for happiness here on earth and the eternal salvation of our children and grandchildren, we can't go on with 'business as usual' or we will be, for the most part, out of business."

One of the most important events in our parish during this Year of Faith will be our **Parish Mission** in February (23rd - 28th). **To benefit from this Mission you need to participate and you need to be present.** Mark your calendar now. Do all you can to schedule nothing else for your evenings or for your family during these days. Our Mission will help you to grow in faith and deepen your personal relationship

with Jesus Christ and with the Church - a community of believers called to be the human face of God. The success of our Mission also depends on this: We all know someone who could benefit from meeting Christ in a more personal way. Many have drifted away because no one cared enough to encourage them back. Everyone of us must invite our friends to our Mission.

"God is the foundational reality, not a God who is merely imagined or hypothetical, but God with a human face; he is God-with-us, the God who loves even to the Cross."

When the disciple arrives at an understanding of this love of Christ 'to the end', He/she cannot fail to respond to this love with a similar love: 'I will follow you wherever you go'."

"It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for one who is rich to enter the kingdom of God." MARK 10:25

These words of Jesus are so harsh that sometimes we are tempted to ignore them, thinking that He really could not have meant them. Yet when our lives revolve around too many material possessions it is difficult to find the necessary time for God, for salvation and for God's beloved poor.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

In the eyes of many, the papacy is a peculiar institution. Still bedecked with some of the regalia of medieval princes, contemporary popes have worked to define their role in ways that give them influence over the world both within and outside the Church. The trappings of royalty, never really a good fit for the successors of Peter, could render a pope distant and irrelevant. On the other hand, the tendency of many to think of the pope as if he were the CEO of a modern corporation is also inaccurate. St. Gregory the Great, himself a pope, first called the pope "the servant of the servants of God." He is "first among equals" among other bishops, who by tradition exercise significant authority within their own dioceses, not depending on the pope's authority. This arrangement often puzzles those accustomed to a top-to-bottom "chain of command." History has seen popes of many styles, but most strive to live up to Gregory's definition. Perhaps today's Gospel puts it all into the best perspective: "Whoever wishes to be first among you will be the slave of all." Pray for the pope this week.

For Daughters of Today and Tomorrow

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month. I know all of you know what cancer is, and that it is life changing when someone receives a diagnosis of cancer. Most of you, if not all of you have heard of breast cancer.

Excluding cancers of the skin, breast cancer is the most common cancer among women, accounting for nearly 1 in 4 cancers diagnosed in US women.

These women are daughters and mothers, they are also granddaughters. Research and education are 2 things that will help raise awareness of breast cancer, as well as other cancers.

RISK FACTORS:

AGE: The chance of getting breast cancer goes up as a woman gets older. More than 3 out of 4 women with breast cancer are over age 50 when diagnosed.

FAMILY HISTORY: Having a mother, sister, daughter, or other close blood relative who has had breast cancer increases a woman's risk.

GENETIC CHANGES: About 5%-10% of breast cancers are linked to inherited changes in certain genes.

PREVIOUS BREAST CANCER: A woman who has had breast cancer is at increased risk of getting a new breast cancer in the other breast or in another part of the same breast.

BEING OVERWEIGHT: After menopause, women who are overweight are at increased risk of getting breast cancer. Being overweight may also reduce a woman's chances of surviving breast cancer after menopause.

HORMONE REPLACEMENT THERAPY AFTER MENOPAUSE: Using hormone replacement therapy after menopause for several years can increase a woman's risk of getting breast cancer. This is especially true when hormone replacement therapy involves estrogen combined with progesterone.

MENSTRUAL PERIODS: Women who began having periods before age 12 or who went through menopause after age 55 are a slightly increased risk for breast cancer.

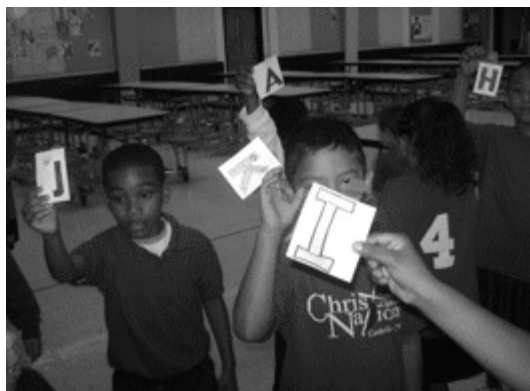
ONE SUNDAY FOR THE WHOLE WORLD

POLITICS AND OUR PARISH

I most certainly would encourage our parish members to **be active in this year's political process** by becoming **informed** concerning the issues, by **considering prayerfully your choices** – ones that will not only benefit you personally but also support the common good – and by **responsibly exercising your right to vote** in this year's election.

All political activity on parish property must conform with these **"Guidelines on the Distribution of Political Literature and Materials"**. These guidelines respect the clear and specific Federal restrictions governing the participation of religious and non-profit organizations in the political process. Furthermore, they both **invite and challenge candidates and political organizations to engage our parish members in conversation and open debate of the issues** in a way that is civil and informative for all concerned.

The "leafleting" of cars or the use of lawn signs does not actively engage our community in the political process, and often are a nuisance or an offense to parish members. **EVERY PARISH MEMBER SHOULD KNOW THAT PERMISSION IS NEVER GIVEN FOR ANY OF THE ABOVE ACTIVITIES.** When these things do occur we will notify such persons or groups of our policy. Every parish member should do the same.

You may want to save the following **"Guidelines"** for your future reference or to pass them on to candidates or political groups for their information.

Guidelines on the Distribution of Political Literature and Materials

The First Amendment to the United States Constitution guarantees the right of all citizens to be involved in the political processes of our nation. Furthermore, it is a moral obligation of all persons – individuals and communities – to be attentive to how their decisions affect other people. We have the right and responsibility to be involved in the political conversations and elections that determine our forms of government and system of laws.

Historically the Catholic Church in the United States has conscientiously refused to participate in partisan politics, particularly the endorsement of individual political parties or candidates. At the same time, the Church has felt a keen responsibility to educate its members as well as the larger community regarding the moral and ethical dimensions of public policy.

Therefore —

Permission will not be given to any individual or group to distribute or place partisan political literature and/or materials on our church property, in particular, it is not permitted to place leaflets on vehicles or lawn signs on parish property which is considered only a "quasi-public area". *Since our parish Community Center is a polling place these activities may take place only on election day near the entrances of the polling station.*

Individuals and groups wishing to publicly state their positions on particular issues, and engage the members of our community in discussing such issues, may be invited to do so according to the interest of the parish and the availability of time and space. Organizations and/or individuals should contact our pastor, Father Mike Henning, to request consideration.
