

Take Courage - Jesus Is Calling


WE ALL SUFFER FROM SOME KIND OF BLINDNESS. At times our blindness may be physical: cataracts, tears, or simply the darkness of shorter days. It may also be psychological, such as close-mindedness or fear. Today's gospel reminds us that if we are willing to ask Jesus for "sight" or "insight", the request will change our lives. We will find ourselves no longer sitting by the side of the road waiting to be helped, but walking with determination on the journey with Jesus - bringing sight to others. Take some time today to consider how seeing your shortcomings, listening to the challenging viewpoint of someone else, or finding something good in a seemingly hopeless situation has improved your vision - of yourself, others, and God. And remember this. Jesus met the blind man where he was on his life's journey, and from that moment - one step at a time - they went forward together.

BISHOP EDWARD RICE WILL CELEBRATE Mass with us on Sunday, November 11th at 10:30am. During Mass we will also celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation for the children from our school and from other religious education programs serving our parish families. I know that our Parish Mission in February will be a great opportunity for each of us to grow in faith and to strengthen our relationship with Jesus Christ and the Church. But, every active member needs to find some way to invite and encourage our inactive members to take another look at practicing their faith. Our Mission Committee will help with this as will God through daily prayer.



TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

"What is the Church if not the assembly of all the saints?" wrote the fifth-century bishop Niceta. Each Sunday, in the Profession of Faith, we express our belief in the communion of saints, the one body—with Christ as its head—made up of "those who are pilgrims on earth, the dead who are being purified and the blessed in heaven." We are not alone! The preface for All Saints begins, "For today by your gift we celebrate the festival of your city, the heavenly Jerusalem, our mother." What astounding words! All Saints Day (like every solemnity) is nothing less than the festival of the fullness of the paschal mystery, our dying and rising in Christ. Of course, now in autumn the mystery comes "clothed" in glorious autumnal garb, and so we celebrate our Easter faith with signs of the harvest, signs of nature's dying, signs of the "homecoming" that happens naturally when the weather gets cold and families find themselves together more often. While the dving can point to our own mortality, the homecoming reminds us of the mystery of our own resurrection with Christ.

COLD & FLU IN SOMEONE WITH ARTHRITIS!

Everyone is more prone to getting sick when chilly weather brings people—and their airborne, surface clinging germs—closer together. But people with inflammatory types of arthritis, like rheumatoid arthritis, face added risk. That's because both the disease and certain therapies to treat it—like biologics and corticosteroids—interfere with the normal workings of the immune system, which offers protection from cold-and flu-causing germs. This can make people with arthritis more vulnerable to pneumonia.

The following are myths and facts about cold and flu in the arthritic person.

MYTH OR TRUTH?

- Drinking water prevents sickness: TRUTH--It can't flush viruses, but it keeps you hydrated.
- Zinc lessens cold symptoms: **JURY'S STILL OUT**--For every clinical trial that shows zinc shortens colds if started within 24 hours of the cold starting, there is a clinical trial that finds it has no effect on the cold.
- Echinacea fights colds: MYTH--Not many studies find that this is helpful and herbal supplements can interact with arthritic drugs.
- To help prevent colds, walk in the sun:
 TRUTH--Getting moderate physical activity and vitamin D, which is produced from exposure to the sun, helps fend off seasonal sicknesses.
- Loading up on vitamin C can ward off colds: MYTH--Many studies have disproved this.
- You can catch a cold through your eyes: TRUTH--Tear ducts are connected to nasal passages, so viruses can enter through your eyes.
- Flu shots are not safe if you have Rheumatoid Arthritis: MYTH--They are safe and effective.

FEDERATION SCHOOLS WORK TO PUT THE "FUN" IN "FUNDRAISING"

It's no secret that finances can be a challenge for Catholic schools. Even with the generous gift that each parish gives for the support of our schools, there is always a need for more funding. Several of our Federation schools have recently held successful school fundraisers that have the added (or even more important) benefit of bringing the school community together for some FUN!


Some examples of fun and successful fundraising that Federation schools have benefitted from include:

- Tapping into the generosity of local restaurants who will often designate a portion of sales on a particular evening to a school. For example, St. Angela Merici School had a great time at McTeacher Night (at McDonalds). According to Mrs. Kaufmann, school principal, this is a great social event of the month. The school raised over \$700 at their September McTeacher night. The students love to see the teachers. It is a great place where parents and teachers simply enjoy each other's company.
- Walk-a-Thons are also popular events that engage the students in a fun activity while raising funds for the school. St. Angela Merici held their 7th Annual Walk-a-thon on Saturday, September 29. Many students earned the right to be on the school's Walk-a-thon Hall of Fame by walking 50 or mope laps around the field. The school met its \$7,500 fundraising goal and earned an extra day off school! St. Rose Philippine Duchesne School held it's 2nd Annual Walk-a-Thon for students during ITBS testing week September 17-21. Students had a chance to get some fresh air and exercise by walking laps on the school field during gym classes and recess periods that week. Together as a school they walked over 1,400 miles and raised \$2,500 for the purpose of renovating the restrooms in the school's main lobby.

Many more creative fundraisers are held regularly at each of the eight Federation elementary schools. Look for more examples in future newsletters.

J MUSIC J at HOLY NAME OF JESUS

There are opportunities for every parishioner at Holy Name of Jesus to praise God in song. First and foremost is Congregational Singing. Our parish does this exceptionally well whether led by our choirs and instrumentalists, the Chris-Tones, our Youth Group, or organists and cantors. Some parishioners choose to devote more time and energy into music ministry out of a love for singing to our Lord or at the encouragement of others. If you have been gifted with the ability to match pitches (prerequisite for all Choirs) or someone has suggested that you sing well, here is a nudge. Consider singing with one of the following Choirs. There is a wide variety of voice types and amounts of time commitment involved. The time spent in rehearsal is enjoyable and rewarding. At least one is suited for you, really.

Holy Name of Jesus Choir – sings one Mass every weekend (with few exceptions), all Holy Days and some holidays. Rehearsals are Wednesdays at 7:00 pm. Open to high school age and up.*

5th Sunday Choir – sings one Mass on a weekend when a 5th Sunday occurs. There are typically 4 one hour rehearsals on varying dates during that particular month. Open to all parishioners who wish to sing in a Choir but find it impossible to commit to the twice weekly schedule of the Holy Name of Jesus Choir.*

Holy Name of Jesus and Our Lady of the Rosary Children's Choir – sings one Mass each month (except in Summer) alternating between the two parishes. Rehearsals are Tuesdays at 5:30 pm. Open to children in 4th thru 8th grades.*

*These Choirs provide musical leadership and congregational support. They often enhance liturgies with harmony and liturgically or seasonally appropriate anthems.

New Life (Funeral) Choir – sings for Funerals and Memorial Masses usually with two or three days notice. This Choir demonstrates the corporal works of mercy in their ministry to grieving families and are a representation of the Parish's prayers and support. There are no rehearsals. Open to all.

Please considering using your talent for and love of singing in one of the Choirs. You will be glad you did and happily welcomed! I am pleased to answer any questions you may have. Also, if you know someone who sings well, encourage them to join, or better yet, join together!
