

I help make it what it is.


It will be friendly, if I am. Its pews will be filled. if I help fill them. It will do great work, Permanent Deacon It will make generous gifts to causes.

Christian Faith - A Marathon Not A Sprint

THE BIBLE IS NOT A BOOK. IT'S A LIBRARY. You can find history, fiction, biography, poetry, and reference works. This week we begin to spend some time in the section oddly known as "apocalyptic literature". You will find this kind of writing in both the Old and New Testaments. It has one purpose: to give hope to people who believe in God.

Apocalyptic writing works something like this. Did you ever look back on a really difficult time in your life and find yourself https://example.com/html. You survived the experience. Maybe you even "grew up" some because of it. You're not pretending it was easy or trying to minimize any of the pain or suffering. But ... you now know something more surely than you did when you were troubled and stressed out - through it all you were never alone. When a writer uses "apocalyptic" images or stories, he or she is trying to capture this kind of common human experience. What we now know "after the fact" can help us move more gracefully through our present challenges. "Apocalyptic" writers even seem to presume things may get worse before they get better, but also that their readers will have a deeper faith in God's deliverance.

First century Christians **needed to be hopeful people**, but they **faced two very difficult challenges**. First, **they discovered a dead Christian**. Early on most of them believe that they would not die before the second coming of Jesus. Now they were dying. This was not suppose to happen. They had to re-orient themselves from a short-term to a long-term faith. Proclaiming a new life in Christ was going to be a marathon not a sprint. They needed to re-train themselves on how to live their faith everyday - for a lifetime.

Secondly, they had to confront the fact that pacifism was at the heart of the historical Jesus' reform of Judaism. Jesus taught non-violence and was convinced that mean people will never be converted to good by someone being meaner than they are.

Paradoxically, living our faith everyday in non-violent ways often seems to bring the worst out of others. Why? Because when we do we threaten any person, group, or institution that uses force to achieve its goals. This is why and when we especially need to know that "God is with us" now and will deliver us from all evil.

DEFEND HUMAN DIGNITY - The catechism of our Church teaches that "the Church's love for the poor...is a part of her constant tradition". Please be as generous as you can in **today's collection** for the **Catholic Campaign for Human Development**. CCHD provides funding for groups that create lasting change and uplift the poor in the United States. In the last five years, over 36% of CCHD's grants have gone toward advancing education, supporting economic development, and improving housing in low-income neighborhoods. I encourage your participation in this tradition. CCHD is the most successful anti-poverty program in the United States.

THIS YEAR OF FAITH calls each of us to a personal encounter with Jesus Christ. Do you want a deeper faith? Greater confidence in the Gospel message? Do you need the faith support of others and want to share your faith? If this is what you want, give yourself the gift of the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Our Advent Penance Service will take place on Tuesday, December 4th, 7:00pm at Our Lady of the Rosary Parish. Everyone is welcome and encouraged to attend. Even if it has been many years. There's no wrong way to go to confession. The peace you will find is priceless!

EVERY DAY, IS A DAY OF THANKSGIVING

There is a Gospel song with these words: "Every day, is a day of Thanksgiving. God been so good to me, every day He's blessing me". Since this is the month when most of us begin to reflect more deeply on all the wonderful things God has given each of us, why not take the time to show God how much you really appreciate those daily graces. What better way to "Glorify the Lord" then through Stewardship. You may start the process with your Prayers, then through Participation in a parish ministry and then by sharing your financial Generosity with not only your parish family but with the community. This is what Stewardship is all about!

So, when you and your family are giving 'Thanks' for all the wonderful things that God has given you, please consider what else you can do to make Stewardship a part of your 'everyday' life. Remember, 'everyday is truly a day of Thanksgiving'.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

This might be a good time to stock our spiritual cupboard along with our kitchen cupboard in preparation for our celebration of Thanksgiving. Before there was a Thanksgiving Day, even before there were Pilgrims, the Roman Catholic Church celebrated Ember Days ("change-of-season days") as periods of thanksgiving for seasonal harvests. This means it is a customary Catholic way to give thanks to God through prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. In the 1969 reformed calendar it was left up to the national conferences of bishops to set dates for Ember Days. (The ones on the old calendar fit a Mediterranean climate, and on the new calendar it was imagined that each nation knew best when to schedule such seasonally oriented days.) The United States bishops have not yet resurrected Ember Days, Rogations Days, and other national days of prayer. However, tucked within Catholic Household Blessings and Prayers (a book published by the U. S. bishops) is a chapter on Ember Days that proposes, among others, the three days before Thanksgiving as days of prayer, charity, and fasting. Why wait for an official proclamation? Why not undertake to observe those three days in that way in your parish, or even in your family? What could be more natural at this time of year?

CRACKING THE STRESS CODE

When did you last notice how tight your shoulders are? Has there been an edginess in your voice? Can you recall the last time you had a good laugh...or a nap?

You often don't realize how stressed you are until something either gives way or breaks down. But paying attention to how you process gives way or breaks down. But paying attention to how you process and store stress—your personal stress code—can help you manage it better.

HERE'S HOW TO CRACK THE CODE:

BE HONEST. Ask yourself whether you're experiencing any of these common signs of suppressed stress:

- Cravings for snacks and comfort food
- Fatigue and forgetfulness
- Inability to relax or enjoy entertainment
- Weight loss, forgetting to eat
- Passive withdrawal, isolating yourself with TV.
- Minor injuries caused by clumsiness

GET A SECOND OPINION

As a friend how they've observed the way you act under pressure. And be willing to hear what they are telling you.

LISTEN TO YOUR BODY. Lower back pain; trick knee; tennis elbow; or recurring ear-,tooth-or headaches may be old wounds reasserting themselves as tension rises. What are your stress "fractures"?

Whenever any of these signs surface, step back, ask yourself what's really important and try to relax. Gradually, as you pay attention to your individual responses, you'll learn how to short-circuit those symptoms and keep stress-related illness at bay.

A wonderful way to curtail or cope with stress, is to sit for at least 5 minutes everyday, with no TV, Computer, IPAD ,iphone, etc....and just be with God ...listen with your heart that to all that God is trying to tell you.

As we enter the season of Advent, please try to spend that extra quiet time in prayer. Christmas will be such a wonderful blessing is you do.
