



#### We Are In Good Hands

**THE IMAGE OF THE HUMAN "HAND"** represents ourselves in relation to someone or something else. We speak of something being "out of our hands", meaning we have no control over a situation, no power to influence its direction or shape its outcome. When we "wash our hands" of something, we free ourselves from any connection with it. When we "hand over" responsibility, we entrust it to another. In today's Gospel Jesus reassures us that we are "in the hands" of God, that nothing can destroy our relationship with God.

The more we strive to secure a common good corresponding to the real needs of our neighbors, the more effectively we love them.

From the Pastoral Letter Charity in Truth (7), Pope Benedict XVI

It was especially important for the early Church - and for us too - to know that they were in the hands of God. They had to deal with the sad and bad things of life as much as we do. Knowing that God loved them made it easier to trust the direction God was giving them as well as the guidance of the community. Knowing we are "in good hands" is the key to giving our lives over for the good of others and to living Gospel values even when they are in opposition to what others may want.

It seems that for many years Pope Francis, Bishop of Rome, has been convinced of the importance our Church being "in the streets". More recently this commission or calling has been described as "shoe leather evangelization". Every baptized Catholic Christian must strive for a lifetime to know that they are "in good hands". Each of us must actively pursue a loving relationship with God. At the same time we must live "in the streets". and support each other in our ability and willingness to make sure that others know they are "in good hands". Human development
is a vocation.
It requires that we are able
to recognize the divine image
in the other and
to mature in a love that becomes
concern and care for the other.
It drives us to be more.

Authentic development has to **promote the good** of every person and of the whole person.

From the Pastoral Letter Charity in Truth (12,18), Pope Benedict XVI

How do we respond to those in need? And who are they? Jesus and his first century disciples laid the foundation. The community of the Church ever since has understood that **the seven corporal works of mercy** help us **to grow in faith** and **to evangelize the world** in which we live - near and far.

Feed the hungry Shelter the homeless Visit the sick

Give drink to the thirsty Clothe the naked Visit the imprisoned Bury the dead

Take some time this week to remember if and when you may have been **on the receiving end** of this kind of love. How did you feel? How did it affect or even change your life? Then consider how God might be calling you to be **on the giving end** of such love. Again ask, how do I feel? How might this change my life or the life of someone else? More than ever our Church needs this kind of "shoe leather evangelization". Almost always it's the first, if not best step, in sharing our faith with others who need to know about God.

#### Earth Day 2013: The Face of Climate Change

Climate change has many faces. A man in the Maldives worried about relocating his family as sea levels rise, a farmer in Kansas struggling to make ends meet as prolonged drought ravages the crops, a fisherman on the Niger River whose nets often come up empty, a child in New Jersey who lost her home to a super-storm, a woman in Bangladesh who can't get fresh water due to more frequent flooding and cyclones...

And they're not only human faces. They're the polar bear in the melting arctic, the tiger in India's threatened mangrove forests, the right whale in plankton-poor parts of the warming North Atlantic, the orangutan in Indonesian forests segmented by more frequent bushfires and droughts... these faces of climate change are multiplying every day.

For many, climate change can often seem remote and hazy – a vague and complex problem far off in the distance that our grandchildren may have to solve. But that's only because they're still fortunate enough to be insulated from its mounting consequences. Climate change has very real effects on people, animals, and the ecosystems and natural resources on which we all depend. Left unchecked, they'll spread like wildfire. Luckily, other faces of climate change are also multiplying every day.

Every person who does his or her part to fix the problem is also a Face of Climate Change: the entrepreneurs who see opportunity in creating the new green economy, the activists who organize community action and awareness campaigns, the engineers who design the clean technology of the future, the public servants who fight for climate change laws and for mitigation efforts, the ordinary people who commit to living sustainably...

On April 22, 2013, more than one billion people around the world will take part in the 43rd anniversary of Earth Day. Communities everywhere will voice their concerns for the planet, and take action to protect it. We'll harness that power to show the world The Face of Climate Change. And we'll call on our leaders to act boldly together, as we have, in this pivotal year.

#### TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The reception of Holy Communion at Sunday Mass is such an expected feature of the Mass these days that it is surprising to realize that for many centuries, receiving Communion was a relatively rare event in the life of a faithful Christian. "Easter duty" means that Catholics must celebrate reconciliation if aware of serious sin, and receive Holy Communion during the Easter season. For a while, this was a requirement of Easter week, and later extended to the whole season of fifty days, and even beyond that by a few weeks. For the majority of people long ago, this meant Communion was a once-a-year moment. A rather complex bureaucracy grew up around this rule in the Middle Ages. Amazingly, people received a kind of token at confession admitting them to Communion in their home parish, which then kept careful records and reported them to the bishop.

Surviving records can tell us a great deal about our ancestors. In fact, people were encouraged to journey to the church of their baptism in order to fulfill their duty, and therefore the Easter duty includes in its origins a grateful pilgrimage to the font in which you were first embraced by Christ. If your "Holy Mother Church" is within a drive, why not make a pilgrimage to that font be a feature of your Easter celebration of these fifty days?

#### APRIL IS NATIONAL DONATE LIFE MONTH

Without the organ donor, there is no story, no hope, no transplant. But when there is an organ donor, life springs from death, sorrow turns to hope and a terrible loss becomes a gift.

Organ, eye, and tissue donation are the greatest gifts anyone, of any age, can give. In the Catholic Church, organ and tissue donation is considered an act of charity and love, and transplants are morally and ethically acceptable to the Vatican.

There is a tremendous need. In April, 2012, more than 114,000 people were on the national waiting list for an organ transplant. Every day 18 people will die waiting for an organ.

Today, the heart, liver, kidneys, pancreas, lungs, and small intestine can all be transplanted into individuals whose own organs are failing. Tissue donors can improve the lives of many more people by donating corneas, heart valves, veins, tendons, bone, and skin.

People of any age, even those with certain chronic medical conditions, may be organ, eye, or tissue donors. The transplant team will determine at an individual's time of death weather donation is possible.

People of all ages and ethnicities can make a difference and save lives by donating their organs, eye, and tissues.

While a recipient and donor may not be of the same ethnicity or race, and people of different heritages often match one another, it is important that an organ donor and recipient have matching blood types-and certain blood types are more common within some ethnic groups.

# MARCH/APRIL CHALLENGE TO FEED THE HUNGRY!

The 16th Annual Feinstein Challenge has a \$1million fund available to help feed the hungry. Agencies that collect cash, checks or food items (valued at \$1 per item) through April 30th will receive a minimum of \$250.00 based on what is collected as a direct result of this challenge. The St. Vincent de Paul Society is asking parishioners to place food item donations in the containers at the entrances to church. Cash and check donations in envelopes marked "2013 Challenge" can be dropped in the collection basket or at the parish office. We received 200 cases of can food from the Boy Scout Drive.
