

# mission notes

we are a mission parish with a mission

**confession is a conversation – sit down and stay a while**

My experience has taught me that most of us were raised on the notion that the Sacrament of Penance was **an obligation** more than **an opportunity**. We were drilled in mechanics of confession. The where and when and how of making a good confession. We memorized our parts and generally benefited from the scheduled opportunities we had as children and maybe even as adults. But as a person grows up, they often need and want more. Many people want this Sacrament to be of greater benefit in their lives. They want it to make a difference in how they love themselves. They want a more God-like generosity in their love for others, especially family and friends, but also strangers and enemies, as is expected of us! They want to be more sure of the love of God—every day!



*We give you thanks, Lord,  
for you spur us on to possess a more abundant life.*

*Being rich in mercy, you constantly offer pardon  
and call on sinners to trust in your forgiveness alone.*

*Never did you turn away from us,  
and though we have broken your covenant,  
you have bound the human family to yourself through Jesus  
with a new bond of love so tight that it can never be undone.*

Eucharistic Prayer for Reconciliation I

One way of ensuring these things will happen might be a change of attitude. Start or keep thinking of this Sacrament as **a conversation**. One which you first have with yourself. The examination of conscience below might help. You could ask someone you trust to tell you about your sin, your weakness, and your evident faith. You're then ready for the Sacrament as **a celebration** of the powerful love of Christ that continues to bring you to life as a new person, better human being in a world hungering for that every day.

## steps in an examination of conscience

### confession of sin

What have I done wrong? What have I deliberately chosen to do or failed to do that may have hurt someone else?

**For what do I feel guilty?** How have I shown a lack of respect for myself, for the goodness of others around me, and for God who gave me my life?

**Sin is selfishness** that breaks down these most important relationships in our lives. To whom and for what do I need to say "**I'm sorry!**"

### confession of weakness

What have I failed to do? What are my tendencies toward sin? Most of us know when we're getting close to making poor or wrong choices. What plan do I need to have to be stronger?

**For what do I feel sad?** Do I really want to give up my old self and be different? Who or what might help me to give up or change the habits that lead me to sin? More than we often realize there are **graceful people and opportunities** in all of our lives for overcoming weakness.

### confession of faith

What am I most grateful for? How often do I acknowledge the goodness of my life? Am I truly someone who takes nothing for granted?

**For what do I feel joyful?** Faith is a relationship deeply rooted in fidelity (staying with the conversation) and gratitude that is always striving to be generous. What about the love of God and the community of faith around me do I most want to proclaim from the housetops for all the world to hear?

## lenten opportunities for reconciliation

As we continue to prepare for Easter and the Pentecost renewal of our Church's mission to the ends of the Earth, this might be a good time for confession.

Often we think of conversations as spontaneous and informal. Many of the best ones we have are just that way. **There's no rush.** We take our time. Father Mike has all the time you may need or want for this. Just give him a call. Or, if you come for one of the scheduled times below, **there's no need to rush.** The questions below will help you prepare for an equally beneficial conversation.

Our curbside ordering and delivery continues to be a real hit and is gaining in popularity each week. If this service would be helpful for you, watch for our friendly volunteers on Ashbrook, near the driveway between the Cafeteria entrance and Church. **For the safety of all, please wear a mask if you would like curbside.**

Beginning this Friday our menu will be expanding! We are adding potato salad as a third side from which to choose. We will also be selling Crab Rangoon – first come, first served.

**Dinner includes:** 2 pieces of fried fish, **choice of two:** spaghetti, cole slaw, or potato salad, along with white bread and 2 packets of tartar sauce.

Cost per dinner is \$10.00.

You can now order an additional side of your choice for \$3.00.

A fish sandwich can be purchased for \$5.00.

Crab Rangoon is 4 pieces for \$3.00 (until sold out).

Masks will be required to enter the Cafeteria, where everyone will need to keep 6' distance in line as you wait to get your food. Food will be pretty much ready to go so that all you have to do is pick it up and be on your way.
