

targeting young adults

Building relationships seems to be the key to bringing young adults back to the Catholic Church and into greater participation in their parishes because it sends the message: **"You are both needed and welcome here."**

demonstrating righteousness

Luke's Jesus makes it perfectly clear for all disciples that **there is significance in everything we do**. Where you choose to sit at table. Who you invite and the expectations you have. Jesus is showing them how to appreciate that fine line between your own importance and the importance of others. The whole point of today's Gospel parable is showing them what **righteousness** looks like and the **resurrection** it brings.

In 1983 Steve Spielberg convinced Universal Studios to buy the rights to Schindler's List. He then predicted that he would start filming in 10 years. He wasn't sure he was ready – mature enough – to tell a Holocaust story. He even tried getting other directors to do it. He was long haunted by a curious question: **"What would drive a man like this to suddenly take everything he had earned and put it all in the service of saving these lives?"** I think this was the same confounding question many disciples have had to face themselves.

Spielberg ends the story in a Catholic cemetery outside Jerusalem at the grave of Oscar Schindler on the occasion of his being honored as a **"Righteous Jew"**. One of the highest honors within their faith community. It's always been good for me to remember **Oscar Schindler**. An imperfect Christian who found enough goodness within himself to do the right thing, the good thing, when it counted the most. He demonstrates for me what righteousness looks like.

In the end, Spielberg, the storyteller, wins best picture and best director for his humble and heartbreaking effort to tell a difficult but worthy story.

journal reporting

The *All Things New* pastoral planning work we're now involved in may be the biggest step our Church has taken in our lifetimes. Why? Because it **envisions** and will seek to **empower every Catholic** to spread the Gospel message today and for generations to come. The work of reorganization will focus on **evangelization** and **social concern** for the communities where Catholics live and worship.

The following **spiritual exercise** will help everyone discover how easy this may be. Each week as you hear the Scripture readings proclaimed in church or read them at home, pay attention to your thoughts and feelings, your hopes and ideas.

Ask yourself these questions. Write down a few things to remember. If the Word of God is talking to you, listen, but talk back just as much, if not more.

What did you hear?

The words may speak to you literally, or through an image or experience they bring to mind.

Careful listening discovers what's written between the lines.

What will it cost?

The more you believe what you read, the more you realize there's a price to pay for what we believe.

So remember, we have each other, and we've all experienced sacrificing for something important and good.

What does it promise?

In the story of the People of God, God's Word always lead someplace good. Think about and write down what that looks like in the most concrete terms you can think of.

Evangelization is talking about the God you know talks with you in these ways. It's showing concern for others because you know God.

The Evangelization Team has developed 11 goals for their first year which began in November. The Team has spent time learning about evangelization by a book study, and other input on-line. They have completed several of their goals already and are in process with the rest.

A few of our **completed goals** are:

Starting up Adoration again since COVID

Creating Greeters for Sunday Masses Placed "We're Here For You" **doorhangers** on 50 doors on Ashbrook to reach out to the neighborhood

Called 210 parishioners who we haven't had any contact with to check on them and update their contact information. The parishioners that we could not reach by phone, we sent self-addressed stamped envelopes and the information sheet for them to return in the mail.

We **held a "Painting the Sacred Within" class.** 22 parishioners and friends attended. It was a great community building event.

Held our first **Grandparents Association** meeting with grandparents and their grandchildren. As a service project, they made sandwiches for St. Vincent DePaul Church for the homeless, had pizza and played games. The evening was enjoyed by all who attended.

Beginning this week our new **Spiritual Reading Library** will be available for you to check out books. Please sign the card in the front pocket and leave it in the basket. Return the card to the book and reshelve it when finished. We've only just started to gather books for our library. More will be available soon. The library is in a bookcase inside the gates to the Adoration Room.

Be watching for other opportunities to participate in parish life.


