

father mike

on being a religious extrovert how was your weekend?

Recently Archbishop Rozanski asked this question of everyone reading the St. Louis Review. He went on to write the following brief article which I found might be an easy way for many more of us to be more comfortable—with practice—talking about our faith.

We get this question all the time. What if we were to answer along the following lines: “You know, my pastor gave a homily that really made me see some things differently in my life. I’m glad I was there to hear it.”

My point is not that we should be virtue-signaling about going to Mass. My point is that somehow we’ve learned to hide this aspect of our lives, to talk about anything and everything about our weekends besides church. What if we unlearned that habit — what if we stopped hiding that part of our lives?

“The task of evangelizing all people constitutes the essential mission of the Church.

It is a task and mission which the vast and profound changes of present-day society make all the more urgent.

Evangelizing is in fact the grace and vocation proper to the Church, her deepest identity. She exists in order to evangelize.”

St. Giovanni Montini, Pope Paul VI, “Evangelii Nuntiandi” #14

“What must I do to inherit eternal life?” That’s the question put to Jesus this week by one of the Pharisees. It’s a good question — right to the heart of the matter. In response, Jesus engages the Pharisees in a good conversation, one that turns some things on their head!

I think people are waiting for the chance to ask us questions, too, and to have conversations that matter. But, very often, we don’t give them the chance to ask. We don’t open up the space in which those conversations can happen. We leave things on the surface, and that’s where they stay.

How did you come to know Jesus? I know how to “say my prayers.” What does it mean to listen to God while I’m praying? How do you find the balance between being Martha and being Mary? Why do you believe in God? How do you find God amid suffering?

People are hungry for deep conversations. And the truth is, it’s only in the depths that they’ll find a life-giving

connection with God. If and when we talk about going to church — not in a pushy way, but in a matter-of-fact way — we open the door to those deeper conversations. The other person can decide whether they want to walk through that door or not.

That’s not yet evangelization. It’s just how we open the door to evangelization. And if the other person decides to walk through that door, what it requires of us is not that we master complex theological concepts, but that we give a basic witness: “Here’s what matters to me, and here’s why.”

I know many people don’t feel prepared to open that door. That’s precisely one of the things that All Things New aims to change: getting us to the point where everyone feels comfortable opening that door and allowing people to walk through it.

We talk about being a welcoming Church. But do we welcome the deep conversations people want to have, or are we intent on continuing to hide the religious part of our lives? If we want to be a welcoming Church, we have to be willing to open up the psychological space in which deeper conversations can happen, and to do it wherever we are. So, here’s the question to prepare for:

“What are you doing this weekend?”

road testing the church a disciple’s final exam

St. Luke’s Gospel story of the Risen Jesus envisions the city of Jericho as Jesus’ last stop with his disciples on the road to Jerusalem. We’ve now spent 10 chapters out of 24 exploring how one becomes a disciple of Jesus. All this preparation now brings us to what might be thought of as their final exam. **How ready are they to move into Jerusalem and all that means?**

A careful reading reveals Luke is telling us at least as much about **Zaccheaus’** spiritual life as he gives us a glimpse of the character of the disciples’ faith. In spite of everything against him, his enthusiasm and his spiritual discipline mark an **enviable closeness to God**. He’s become a **patron saint for anyone wanting to be a disciple**. But, their grumbling right along with the crowd betrays that the disciples may be failing this final test.

Luke’s Jesus is implicitly asking us, “**Can you recognize a ‘descendent of Abraham’ when we see one?**” It can be anyone who’s **ready to let God direct their life**. If so, they can then expect to be **invited into the intimacy of the table of the Lord**—much sooner than might be expected.

Communion of Saints Devotion

The month of November has traditionally been a time when the Church celebrates the Communion of Saints, prays for those who have died, and prepares us to welcome the one St. Francis called "Sister Death". In keeping with this tradition, we will once again be creating Communion of Saints devotion areas, on which we will honor, not only some recognized Saints of the Church but our loved ones who have gone before us. We are inviting families to share with us a photograph (in a frame if possible) of loved ones who have died. In order to design the devotional spaces, we ask photos be turned into the Parish Office or brought to the sacristy of the church by October 30.

All photos will be returned in December.


Exercise Classes St. Rose Philippine |Duchesne


