### Dear Brothers & Sisters,

Praise be Jesus Christ! May the peace and joy of our dearest Lord be in your souls. Thank you, Lord for Sr. Mary Lawrence, and all our homebound parishioners whom you continue to surround with your love and healing touch. On this 19th Sunday in Ordinary Time, we gather to reflect on the powerful message conveyed in today's readings. It serves as a reminder that our faith and strength are often tested by challenging situations that arise in our lives. Just as Peter, one of Jesus' closest disciples, attempted to walk on water, we too are called to step out of our comfort zones and trust in God's power to guide us.

Walking on water, a seemingly impossible feat, represents the daunting trials and tribulations we face in our daily lives. It symbolizes the troubled waters of cynicism, in our case the challenge of current Parish transition, temptation, betrayal, and corruption that threaten to engulf us. These turbulent waters can easily shake our faith and lead us astray if we allow them to.

Yet, in the midst of these challenges, Jesus calls out to us, just as he did to Peter, saying, "Take courage, it is I; do not be afraid." These words echo through the ages, reminding us that we are not alone in our struggles. We have a Savior who walks beside us, ready to extend his hand and lift us up when we falter.

But the question remains: Will we have the courage to listen to the voice of Christ and step out onto the troubled waters? Will we have the strength to overcome cynicism, temptation, betrayal, and corruption and rely on God's word?

In a world filled with cynicism, where doubt and skepticism seem to prevail, it takes great courage to trust in something greater than ourselves. It takes courage to believe in the power of love, compassion, and forgiveness when the world tells us to be self-centered and indifferent. It takes courage to stand up for what is right, even when it seems like the whole world is against us.

Temptation, too, is a formidable force that can easily lead us astray. It entices us with promises of instant gratification and temporary pleasure, but in the end, it leaves us empty and broken. Will we have the strength to resist these temptations and choose the path of righteousness?

Betrayal, a painful experience that many of us have encountered, can shake the very foundation of our faith. It can make us question the goodness of others and even the goodness of God. Yet, in the face of betrayal, will we find the strength to forgive and trust again?

Corruption, a cancer that plagues societies and institutions, can erode our faith in humanity. It can make us cynical and disillusioned, causing us to lose hope in the possibility of a better world. Will we have the courage to confront corruption and work towards justice and integrity?

My dear friends, let us reflect on these examples given in today's reading and ask ourselves these challenging questions. Will we have the courage to listen to the voice of Christ and walk on the troubled waters of cynicism, temptation, betrayal, and corruption? Will we find the strength to uphold our values and rely on God's word in all circumstances?

As we strive to answer these questions, let us remember that we are not alone in our journey. We have a loving and compassionate God who walks beside us, ready to guide us through the stormy seas. Let us trust in His power and find solace in His presence.

### Hearing Sunday's Scriptures as a Community, August 13, 2023

Elijah on the Lam, Peter in the Water

### GOSPEL READING:

This drama takes place on the water, a mysterious, untamed and unexplorable place. The Priestly source of Genesis says that water predates creation, that God's breath had to sweep over it before God could do any other creative actions. (Genesis 1:2)

All this contributes to the significance of Jesus' walking on the water. He wields God's power over a realm that had been more or less exempt from it. It's a statement that, in Jesus, God's saving work of creation becomes more complete.

Secondly, Matthew, given his audience of Christians of Jewish origin, constantly depicts Jesus as the new Moses. Jesus has gone up a mount to reveal a new law, as did Moses; he has fed multitudes miraculously, like Moses; and now he masters the sea, as did Moses while leading the Israelites out of Egypt.

So today's story can't end until the seafarers pay Jesus homage and call him "the Son of God."

In your community, discuss how to complete this analogy: The disciples in the boat are to the sea on which they are sailing, as our community is to ...

Matthew presents Jesus as the new Moses. That's the new expressed in terms of the familiar. In your evangelization efforts,

- Choosing to follow Jesus is the new ... (what?)
- Membership in the community is the new ...
- The stance of your community in the world is the new ...
- What else is new that might be understood in this way?

### FIRST READING:

Briefly, here's how Elijah earned his reputation and his ticket to Horeb. Israel's prophets always worked to keep their kings faithful to Israel's covenant with the LORD, which meant strict separation from the surrounding countries and their religions. But the kings always wanted to increase their influence and prestige

among the nations. Against all prophetic advice, King Ahab married the pagan princess Jezebel, who brought her religion and priests (they worshiped Ba'al) into Israel. Elijah thundered warnings against all this.

The struggle ended in a duel of rituals. Elijah dared the priests of Ba'al to build an altar, place a sacrificial bull on it, and call on Ba'al to send down fire to burn the sacrifice. Then he mocked them when Ba'al sent no fire. Then Elijah built an altar, spread out a bull carcass on it, ordered the altar soaked in water three times, and called on the LORD to consume it in fire. "Then the fire of the Lord fell and burned up the sacrifice, the wood, the stones and the soil, and also licked up the water in the trench," (1 Kings 18:38).

Elijah slew the losers with his sword, so Queen Jezebel put a price on his head, So Elijah fled. In his journey, he tired and prayed for peaceful death. An angel sustained him, and his faith in the LORD and in his own calling still shaken, he finally arrived at Horeb. That is where Sunday's reading begins.

The common application of this part of the story is that God is not always found in the spectacular, but often in the quiet, the barely noticeable.

- Has your community had to revise downward its expectations?
- Has something that seemed routine ever become an important turning point in your history?

In the rest of 1 Kings 19, the LORD sends Elijah back to Israel, with orders to recruit two kings and a successor prophet, to continue the work of reform. So much for Elijah's retreat.

 How have you felt your community called to suck it up and just keep on struggling?


