

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Laudetur Jesus Christus, In Saecula Saeculorum! Today, on the 26th Sunday in Ordinary Time, we are reminded of the importance of taking responsibility for our own conduct and being judged accordingly. In other words, it's about the freedom we have to choose between saying 'Yes' or 'No' to God. However, with this freedom comes great responsibility for our actions. At times, we may misuse our freedom, but God's goodness always calls us to repentance. In the Christian community, self-seeking and rivalry have no place, and we are called to imitate the humility of Christ. In the first reading from Ezekiel (18:25-28), we are reminded that each of us is accountable for our own conduct and will be judged accordingly. This emphasizes the importance of taking responsibility for our actions and striving to live in accordance with God's will.

The second reading from *Philippians (2:1-5)*, teaches us that self-seeking and rivalry have no place in the Christian community. <u>Instead, we are called to imitate the humility of Christ. Let us set aside our selfish desires and strive to live in harmony and unity, following the example of our Lord.</u>

Lastly, the Gospel (Matt.2:28-32) reminds us that actions speak louder than words. Just as being in a holding pattern during a flight can be frustrating, we can find ourselves in holding patterns in various aspects of life. Whether it's in our jobs, unhealthy habits, or relationships, we may feel stuck, circling in the same patterns day after day. However, Jesus teaches us through the parable of the Two Sons that it is never too late to change.

Even those who were considered "sinners" by society, such as tax collectors and prostitutes, were entering the kingdom of God before the religious authorities. They were willing to admit their wrongs, be honest about what needed to change, and allow God to show them a new path forward.

Brothers & Sisters, as we reflect on these scriptures, let us examine our hearts and ask ourselves if we are truly living in accordance with God's will. Are we using our freedom responsibly? Are our actions aligned with the teachings of Christ? Let us seek God's mercy and guidance as we strive to walk the path of righteousness.

May the Lord make us know His ways and teach us His paths. May He guide us when we stray and lead us in the right path. And may His mercy and love be ever present in our lives. Remain blessed. Jesus loves you! Amen. In Christ, Through Mary,

Dear Parishioners,

I wanted to offer a word of thanks to all those who are praying for the success of the All-Things New plan as we move forward in the process. I can feel your prayers and support at this time.

I want to dispel a rumor and give you the facts of the matter.

In early August, Holy Name of Jesus Church was involved in a serious case of bank fraud. An outsider in another state, was able to compose a check and cash that check for a large amount. Thanks be to God that our banking institution was quickly aware and they returned the money back to the parish account. The bank froze all of Holy Name of Jesus bank accounts because of this outsider's actions. Since all the bank accounts were frozen and I was in Nigeria visiting my ailing mother at the time, all accounts payable invoices were processed through St. Norbert Church. Holy Name is reimbursing St. Norbert for its expenses until we can open new bank accounts. At no time, were any monies used from St. Angela Church to pay any expenses from Holy Name or St. Norbert Church. Please reach out to me if you have questions about this issue. This rumor and others like do not help the process of coming together as one Catholic Church. Please reach out to me so I can give you the facts of the process.

As I have said, change is very difficult but we must trust each other in the process and depend upon the Holy Spirit to guide us as we journey together.

Discover the Fascinating World of the Synod on Synodality

Dear Brothers & Sisters, Praise be Jesus Christl

We are pleased to remind you of our upcoming Synodal journey in *Universal Church*. So, prepare to embark on an extraordinary journey as the Vatican hosts the first-ever global Synod on Synodality, where clergy and laity will convene for a month of captivating discussions. Here's everything you need to know:

The Synod on Synodality, initiated by Pope Francis in 2021, is a worldwide endeavor aimed at fostering unity and growth within the Catholic Church. It involves multiple stages, from local dioceses to global assemblies, with the goal of advising the pope on building a synodal Church.

Synodality, as defined by the Church, is the action of the Holy Spirit in the communion of believers and their missionary journey. It encompasses the form, style, and structure of the Church, emphasizing constructive dialogue and respectful listening.

During the upcoming synod assembly, (Oct. 4–28 and the second in October 2024 to advise the pope on the topic "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, Mission.") three key questions will be explored: How can we deepen our union with God and promote unity among humanity? How can we better share our gifts and serve the Gospel? And what processes, structures, and institutions are needed for a synodal Church? The synod assembly will delve into various thought-provoking topics, including the role of women deacons, priestly celibacy, LGBTQ outreach, and the exercise of authority within the Church. It also aims to explore lessons from other Christian communities regarding the exercise of authority and responsibility.

This synod differs from previous ones as it includes voting delegates who are not bishops, such as laypeople, priests, consecrated women, and deacons. The assembly will take place in the Paul VI Hall, fostering a more inclusive and collaborative environment.

Leading up to the Vatican assembly, there will be a retreat for bishops and participants, an ecumenical prayer vigil, and various preparatory events to ensure a fruitful and prayerful synodal experience.

Cardinal Jean-Claude Hollerich and Cardinal Mario Grech are key organizers of the Synod on Synodality, playing crucial roles in shaping this historic event. Let us join in prayer for the Synod on Synodality, seeking the guidance of the

Holy Spirit to lead us towards unity, truth, and a synodal Church that embraces the challenges of our time. Remain Blessed, Jesus Loves you!

REMINDER: We will have Mass on Friday, October 6th at 8:00am. We will continue to have 8:00am Mass on the FIRST FRIDAY EVERY MONTH ONLY.

At Sunday mass, you're going to try to listen to the first reading. Here, in a one-minute read without preaching, is the background to prepare you for that:

Ezekiel prophesied to the Jews during their Exile in Babylon. This was 600 years after their Exodus from Egypt and 600 years before Jesus of Nazareth. Their religion was being purified by the experience of exile. They held some tenacious, simple-minded beliefs that Ezekiel tried to correct:

- One was that sinners could never convert.
- Another was that guilt got passed from parents to children. (They had a proverb: "Our ancestors have eaten green grapes, and their children's teeth are set on edge.")
- A third was that God was more strict and punitive than merciful. All this is in Ezekiel, chapter 18, before the verses that form our first reading. The prophet declares that the LORD declares that all those doctrines are wrong. God IS merciful, children DO NOT inherit guilt, sinners CAN repent. And how do the people respond to the prophet? They shout "God's ways are not fair!" They would rather keep their folk-religion than accept the loving kindness of God and enjoy the possibilities that it opens for them. So Ezekiel just says it all again. And that's Sunday's first reading. (And it preps us to hear Sunday's gospel, where Jesus, in a different context, declares essentially the same good news.)
