

Cultivating Personal Growth and Using Talents for Good

Dear Brothers and Sisters, Laudetur Jesus Christus! On this 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Times, we reflect on the remarkable woman described in the passage from Proverbs (Proverbs 31:10-13.19-20.30-31). In a world Iwhere talent is often defined by different standards, she defies expectations and becomes a shining example of industriousness, care, wisdom, and virtue. In the Gospel (Matthew 25:14-30), Christ shares the parable of the talents, teaching us the profound wisdom in how we await the glorious return of the Lord. He commends those who use their talents wisely and censures those who bury them. It is a reminder that our accomplishments and personal growth go beyond external achievements, focusing instead on what we make of ourselves.

In a reunion of past pupils, an elderly priest found himself surrounded by former students who had achieved great success in their careers. However, when he asked them what they had made of themselves, a long silence followed. It became apparent that many had neglected their personal lives while pursuing professional success, leaving their emotional growth and relationships impoverished. We must remember that true fulfillment is not solely found in public achievements. Picasso [Pablo Picasso revolutionized the art world and to many is THE artist of the 20th century. He is famous for his role in pioneering Cubism with Georges Braque and for his melancholy Blue Period pieces] despite his artistic success, faced personal struggles and failed relationships. Many individuals who excel in their careers often leave their personal lives behind, achieving success at the expense of their own well-being.

The woman in the First Reading serves as a model, not because of fame or material success, but because of the kind of person she is. She possesses a loving heart and uses her talents to serve her family, neighbors, and the poor. Her impact is felt within the community, earning her respect and admiration.

As we reflect on our own lives, let us ask ourselves: What accomplishments and personal growth have shaped the individuals we are today? Life itself is a gift from God, and what we do with our lives is our gift back to Him. Remember, it is not just about what we do, but who we are. Let us embrace the wisdom of Christ's parable and use our talents to serve others, for in doing so, we honor the precious gift of life that God has bestowed upon us. Prayer: Divine Source of all blessings, we humbly express our profound gratitude to you, O God, as the architect of our existence and the one who offers redemption. In your boundless generosity, we beseech your guidance so that we may utilize the abundant gifts bestowed upon us to magnify your splendor and serve our fellow beings selflessly. We offer this prayer in the name of Christ, our Savior. Amen! Have a blessed Week!

Dear Parishioners, Praise be Jesus Christ!

I would like to reflect on the recently concluded First Session of the Synodal Assembly on the theme "For a Synodal Church. Communion, Participation, Mission." This assembly brought together individuals from diverse backgrounds who are united by their common baptism in a world that often feels divided.

During the assembly, we addressed pressing issues such as the cries of the poor, challenges faced by migrants, victims of violence, and the impacts of climate change. Our goal was to find ways for the Church to promote reconciliation, hope, justice, and peace.

The assembly in Rome began with an ecumenical vigil, where leaders and representatives from other churches and Christian communities joined us in prayer. This emphasized the importance of unity and collaboration in our shared mission.

It's important to note that this synodal process involved not only bishops but also members of the People of God, including lay people, consecrated individuals, deacons, and priests. This highlights the involvement of the entire Church in shaping our collective journey.

The current synodal process is part of a larger journey that started more than two years ago. Each Çhurch engaged in a listening process and recorded the results in documents. Guided by the teachings of the Second Vatican Council, this process builds upon the Council's legacy and seeks to implement its teachings on the Church as a Mystery and People of God. We value the contributions of all the baptized in deepening our understanding and practice of the Gospel.

The Synthesis Report, which gathers key elements from dialogue, prayer, and discussions, emphasizes the importance of listening, sharing, and prayer. It also highlights the challenges of embracing differing ideas and contributing as gifts rather than absolutes.

Walking together as baptized individuals, with diverse charisms, vocations, and ministries, is crucial for our communities and the world. The world needs our testimony of evangelical solidarity.

The Synthesis Report follows the roadmap outlined in the Instrumentum laboris (working instrument). It reflects on the signs of a synodal Church and discusses various topics, proposals, and areas requiring further study.

Moving forward, <u>Episcopal Conferences and the hierarchical structures of the Eastern Catholic Churches will play a crucial role in developing reflections, focusing on pressing questions, deepening understanding, and considering pastoral, theological, and canonical implications.</u>

Let us continue to pray and support one another as we journey together towards a more synodal Church, rooted in *communion*, *participation*, and *mission*. Have a blessed week!

Here are 125 words about Sunday's readings, and two questions that the readings raise for any Christian community, as a community.

Lately, including today, we've been reading gospel and

epistle texts about getting prepared for Jesus to return in glory. What's peculiar is all the texts turned out to be wrong. Nothing like what the texts predicted happened, then or since. So what did the early Church do as this error became apparent? They shrugged and they adapted. They looked for ways to be faithful to Christ in the long haul. They took responsibility for their future in the world, the world from which they were not going to be rescued any time soon. Remarkably, they did not erase the records of their earlier expectations. In other words, the people who are saying "We expected Jesus to come again but he did not," are also saying, "We made a mistake, but we're still sticking with Jesus. We'll find new ways to do it. Maybe Jesus predicted it wrongly, or we just misunderstood; it doesn't matter. Our expectation was commensurate with his impact on us. That impact hasn't changed. We're sure he's the Son of God (God sent the very best; there's nothing better to wait for). We will always call him, "Lord" and we will always find him in the least and most unassuming of our neighbors (see next week's gospel).

- A thoughtful community response would be to ask what expectations we're clinging to, when maybe we should shrug and adapt.
- Another appropriate response would be to repent if we're covering up any mistakes.
