

To Wait on others is to Await the Return

Dear brothers and sisters, Laudetur Jesus Christus! Welcome to the First Sunday of Advent! Today, we will explore some powerful readings that reflect on the challenges we face and our relationship with God. Let's dive in and discover the messages they hold for us. In Isaiah (63:16-17; 64:1, 3-8), we are confronted with a poignant reflection on the challenges faced during a period of reconstruction, where the prophet fearlessly acknowledges the disconnect between life and our relationship with God. In the second reading I Corinthians 1:3-9, We witness Paul's intricate bond with the Corinthians, as he expresses gratitude for their unique gifts and offers a prayer for their unwavering faith, mirroring God's own faithfulness. Lastly, the Gospel of Mark 13:33-37 presents us with an Advent wake-up call, urging us to remain vigilant amidst the chaos and distractions of our busy lives. Are you ready to delve into these transformative readings?

As we enter the season of Advent, let us reflect on the valuable lessons we can learn from unexpected visitors, or "pop-ins," and how they teach us to be prepared and open to God's presence in our lives. In the past, people were always ready to receive guests, and perhaps we can learn from their readiness. Of course, avoiding all this anxiety is quite simple. The key is to always be prepared - whether it's by keeping our home tidy, having ample supplies, dressing presentably, or anything else. The challenge arises from the rarity of unexpected visits, causing us to lose the expectation of surprise knocks on our door. Consequently, we may become lax, caring less about the state of our home, and staying organized.

During Advent, Mark teaches us that vigilance before the Parousia involves, being in charge, having authority, which means serving others rather than seeking to be served. Our waiting and preparedness serve a threefold purpose. We look back and remember when God broke into the world through Jesus, who changed everything. We look forward with hope, anticipating Jesus' return and the fulfillment of God's plan. But we must also be watchful for God's presence in the present moment, "Watch, therefore; you do not know when the lord of the house is coming..." as He desires to be reborn in our hearts this Christmas and every day thereafter.

Brothers and Sisters, Advent is a journey of faith, it is a continual process of re-examining our relationship with God. While we may never fully reach our intended destination in this life, we walk the journey with trust, giving our best effort to follow where God leads. On this Journey, we will hear Jesus' continuous call to "Be watchful! Be alert!" from this first Sunday of the Church Year.

Sometimes, we mistakenly believe that the goal of our spiritual life is to tirelessly pursue God, meaning, or truth as if they are distant and elusive. However, we must remember that God always acts first, speaks first, and loves first. Stepping out in faith means allowing God to find us, come to us, and accompany us on the journey.

The Eucharist serves as a reminder of Christ's self-giving nature and offers a model for our community. It encourages us to reflect this selflessness by meeting each other's needs and affirms that waiting on others is an integral part of anticipating the return of Jesus.

Let us be open to God's unexpected visits, allowing Him to "pop-in" to our lives. By prioritizing the common good and selflessly serving, we affirm that waiting on others is synonymous with awaiting the return of Jesus. Will we accept God on our terms, according to our plans and expectations? Or will we embrace the possibility of encountering Him in ways we never imagined? Remember, God might have just pulled into your driveway. Have a blessed Advent Season!

Prayer: Oh God, shake us from the drowsiness of our daily routines, opening our eyes to behold your divine presence in each moment, and to recognize your reflection in the souls of every person we encounter, both today and for the rest of our lives. Amen!

Eight hundred years ago in Greccio, Italy, St. Francis of Assisi wanted "to do something that will recall the memory of that Child who was born in Bethlehem". St Francis wanted the people of Greccio to see (with their own eyes) the inconvenience and discomfort of His birth. In December of 1223, with the help of his friends, John and Alticama Valita, Francis created a living Nativity scene inside a cave. Included was a manger that served as Jesus' crib, a live ox and donkey standing beside the Child.


Through these visual aids, Francis wanted everyone to understand how Christ came into the world in such poverty and simplicity. This 800-year-old gift to us was a typical perspective of St. Francis' unique attribute of simple poverty-centered spirituality.

Understanding the Meaning of Advent: The Three Comings of Christ and Their Significance

Dear brothers and sisters, Praise be Jesus Christ!

This weekend we begin our Advent journey in preparation to welcome our dearest Lord into our hearts. The word "Advent" comes from the Latin word adventus, meaning "coming" or "arrival" It refers to the first coming of Jesus on Christmas day, as well as his spiritual coming into the lives of believers and his final coming at the end of the world. St. Bernard of Clairvaux explains that the middle coming is like a road that connects the first and last comings, where Christ is our rest and consolation This middle coming is a spiritual one, where Christ comes to dwell within our souls, often through the sacraments. During Advent, we prepare for all three comings of Christ. May our dearest Lord grant us the graces we need to continually open the door of our hearts for him. Have a blessed and refreshing Advent Season!

An Advent tradition from the French culture is the custom of preparing the manger for Christmas. This is the tradition of making the manger a soft bed for the Baby Jesus. Think of ways you can prepare for Jesus by: spending extra time in prayer, thinking of others, doing works of mercy, or however you choose. Be creative. The manger is a symbol of our hearts. Advent is a time to prepare one's heart for Christ's coming at Christmas. Thus, we create an ample supply of bedding to keep Jesus warm and to soften the hardness of the manger boards by the preparations we make during the next four weeks.

The greeters, this weekend will be handing out several slips of paper for you to record what preparations you are making for Christ's coming. There will be extra slips of paper at the church doors each week if you would like to add more. We ask you to return them to the crib, in church, throughout the weeks of advent.
